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Course Objectives

Become fluent in part-writing, including all diatonic triads, seventh chords, and traditional non-chord tones, and in theoretical analysis of associated elements in idiomatic pieces. Emphasis will be placed on the students' voice-leading fluency, with regular homework assignments, in-class exercises, and two major composition projects which encompass the elements listed above.

Student Learning Outcome: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to analyze all diatonic chords and non-chord tones in the literature, and be able to compose an idiomatic piece using these elements.

Absences: Excessive absences will result in the lowering of your grade because of the nature of the course. ***Any absence no matter how "legitimate" they may seem (outside medical emergencies or absences excused by the dean) is considered "unexcused." More than 5 unexcused absences may result in automatic failure. Note that the 'freeby' absences still count as unexcused and towards this limit.*** Assignments must be turned in **on the due date, at the beginning of class**. In other words, if you are late to class, your homework will be counted LATE. Late assignments will lose a letter grade (i.e. 10 points) for each **DAY OF THE WEEK** that they are late (i.e. if it's due Monday and you turn it in Wednesday, it's 20 points off. Weekends count as two days. All pop quizzes, quizzes, and exams must be taken on the scheduled date and time; make-up exams will only be given with a doctor's note or a letter from the Student Affairs Division.

Be in class on time. You are responsible for any rescheduling of assignments or class material you miss because of lateness. Chronic lateness will not be accepted.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period (***ends Sunday, January 22nd***) After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw.
