General Description: The purpose of this course is to begin to introduce students to some of the fundamental issues and challenges of classroom teaching at the University level. It is also intended to provide students with the opportunity to develop technical skills that will meet these challenges through hands-on experiences.

Specific Requirements and Objectives: The class will meet once a week on Mondays from 11-11:50 in Room 428LS. Preparation of course syllabi, demonstrations, and testing will be covered in detail. Special emphasis will be given to developing skills as a lecturer through opportunities to present mini-lectures and videotaped analysis of presentations. At the end of the course, students should have developed an increased awareness of the nature of the teaching enterprise, new understanding of ways in which one might approach designing, developing, and implementing an undergraduate-level course, and growth in skills required to face the college classroom with competence and confidence. Students will be required to complete various assignments during the Semester, and there will be one Final Essay Examination, which will consist of addressing various issues/methods reviewed during the course of the Semester.
