<u>Course description:</u> **3303. Drugs and Behavior** (**3-0**) **3 hours credit.** Psychoactive agents, their therapeutic uses, and social abuses. Alcohol, nicotine, caffeine, narcotics, hallucinogens, stimulants, and tranquilizers.

Examinations and Grading: There will be two multiple-choice examinations and a class project. You are required to take both exams and complete the class project. If you miss an exam or fail to complete the project, a grade of zero will be given. The exams will account 90% towards the final grade and the class project will account for 10% of the final grade. A≥85, B: 84 - 75, C: 74 - 65, D: 64 - 55 and F<55%. Details of the class project will be provided in class. **Note:** Make-up exams will only be given to those with University-approved excuses (see Catalog) or at the discretion of the instructor.
