

OBJECTIVES

In Spanish 1441, the objective of the course is to develop skills in the areas of listening, reading, writing and speaking in the Spanish language. Mastery of grammatical structures is also highly emphasized for enhanced communication and comprehension.

Transfer students, students who have taken high school Spanish or have Spanish-speaking relatives are encouraged to take the UTA CLEP placement test. STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES BY TEXTBOOK CHAPTERS

- **Chapter 1 Ante todo:** Meet and greet others, describe yourself and others, count to 30, talk about likes and dislikes, tell time, get information by asking questions, know "ser, gustar, and hay" and some interrogative words.
- Chapter 2 En la universidad: Talk about your university, discuss your courses and professors, talk about activities you do on campus. You should know articles, -ar verbs, "estar", negation, interrogative words.
- Chapter 3 La familia: Describe friends and family, tell your age, identify a person's nationality, tell what belongs to you and others. You should know "ser", possessive adjectives, -er and -ir verbs, placement of adjectives.
- **Chapter 4 De compras:** Discuss clothing, shopping, prices, point out people and things, discuss preferences, talk about the future. You should know demonstrative adjectives, stem-changing verbs, "tener" idioms, "ir + a + infinitive", contractions.
- Chapter 5 En casa: Discuss routines, describe where you live. You should know reflexive pronouns.
- Chapter 6 Las estaciones y el tiempo: Talk about the weather, point out where things are located, talk about what you are doing right now, describe personality traits and conditions, make comparisons. You should know prepositions of place, present progressive, ser vs. estar, structures used to form comparisons.



♦ Connect Orientation. This shows you how to navigate within the CONNECT online platform and use the various features in this course.


♦ Syllabus Quiz

This is mandatory. This is proof of having read and understood all of the requirements for the course as outlined in this syllabus.

♦ Voice Recording Test

You must also do a sample recording to make certain that you are able to record properly on your computer equipment. You are 100% responsible for resolving any possible issues with this. **Please note**: sometimes web platforms can work better on a different browser. If you are using Internet Explorer (IE), for example, you might want to try Firefox or Safari if you have having issues.

What assignments will I complete for each chapter?



What about the items marked "Practice Only"?




- ◆ Each chapter has **Pronunciation, Vocabulary, & Grammar** practice which **is not part of your grade**.
- ♦The Pronunciation Practice is especially important, because that is where you will be able to listen to vocabulary and dialogues in the textbook. These activities also contain a record button so that you can listen to the language model, record your voice, and play each one back for comparison.



Do the "Practice Only" activities offer any extra help?

For each question in the Practice Activities, you can click on "Ask your instructor a question" if you are uncertain about something. Your instructor will receive your question on his/her *Connect* home page in the message box which will also contain a link to the question itself. Your instructor will then send you a reply which you can access by clicking on your own message box from your *Connect* home page.



Are all the other items in each chapter required work? When can I access them?

Yes. The order of assignments in the chapter list goes by due dates in chronological order. Please note:


- ♦ All chapter work that is required is made accessible from the "start" date of each chapter, EXCEPT for the Chapter Test. (See Course Calendar)
- ◆ Each required item (Vocabulary, Grammar, Speaking, Writing, etc.) is due on a certain date as the chapter progresses and cannot be accessed after that (except for *LearnSmart* Vocabulary & Grammar; see below.)
- ♦ The Chapter Test is only accessible on the final 2 calendar days of a chapter.

What is LearnSmart? How does it work?




- **♦** LearnSmart represents vocabulary and grammar modules to help you learn and practice the chapter content.
- ♦ There is no limit to the number of times you can access it. The due date shown in these activities is only to let you know when your most recent score will enter the instructor's gradebook. You may access *LearnSmart* activities for practice at any time during the course.
- ♦ LearnSmart will give you the answers if you do not know them. It will continually recycle questions on vocabulary and grammar that you do not get correct until you achieve a grade of 100% (unless you abandon the activity before achieving a perfect score.) The amount of time that it takes will, of course, depend on how well prepared you are when you begin the activity.

Will I also get feedback in the Workbook/Lab Manual? Can I save my work? How is it graded?




- ◆The Workbook/Lab Manual will give you feedback information after your 1st submission. On successive submissions, you will get the correct answers. See file on Lower Level Spanish Student blog for explanation.
- ♦You have an unlimited number of submissions for a grade **up to the due date**. After that, your highest score will be recorded in the instructor's gradebook and you will no longer have access to it. All activities in the Workbook/ Lab Manual are auto-graded.
- ♦ If you do not have time to complete the work in a single session, you can click "SAVE & EXIT." The next time you open the activity, your previous work will be there for you to build on. NOTE: No feedback or scores are given if you only click "Save & Exit." In order to get feedback, you must click SUBMIT ASSIGNMENT.

How do the Writing Assessments work?



- ♦You may access the Writing Assessments at any time from the original access date for the chapter, but they will always be due a few days before you take your Chapter Test.
- ♦ The Writing Assessments contain questions which must be answered in paragraph form in Spanish. **Keep in mind:**All writing assessments are very guided and based on the specific vocabulary and grammar structures you have learned. You are never required to write anything you have not studied and practiced in the coursework, so always do only your own work. Suspicion of getting help of any kind will be subject to a grade of zero and a report to Student Conduct. See *Academic Integrity* in this syllabus.
- ♦ If you do not have time to complete the work in a single session, you can click "SAVE & EXIT." Your work will be graded on the most recent **submission** made before the deadline. It will be graded manually by your instructor with comments on your errors. To see comments, click on "SEE REPORT."

What about letters with accent marks, the "ñ" and special Spanish punctuation marks?



- ♦ As seen in the screen capture above, in any writing activity, whether it is the actual Writing Assessment or a fill-in-theblank question, a writing palette appears as soon as you click your cursor into the area where you must write. NOTE: If a word requires an accent mark and you do not use one, or place it incorrectly, or if you use an accent mark
- NOTE: If a word requires an accent mark and you do not use one, or place it incorrectly, or if you use an accent mark when the word does not need one, your answer will be marked completely wrong. No partial credit is given.
- ♦ Alternatively, you may wish to add a Spanish Keyboard to your computer that you can activate when you are working on *Connect*. How do I do the Speaking Assessments?




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- ♦You may access the Speaking Assessments at any time from the original access date for the chapter, but they will always be the last chapter assignment before you take your Chapter Test.
- ♦ The Speaking Assessments contain written prompts which you will record your answers to in Spanish. The recording has a time limit of 2 minutes. This is more than sufficient to answer the questions unless you leave very long pauses in your response. You may re-record as many times as you wish before submitting. Be sure to play your recording back to make certain that it is loud enough and that it is free of distracting background noises.
- Your Speaking Assessment will be graded manually by your instructor with comments on your errors, pronunciation, content, and overall fluency. To see comments, click on "SEE REPORT."
 NOTE: Do not leave this until the last minute before it is due. If a technical recording issue arises, you need plenty of time to find another computer where you can do your recording.
- ♦ IMPORTANT: The first time you press the "RECORD" button, a POP-UP window will appear asking you to adjust the

Adobe Flash Player settings. These adjustments are very simple and you do them DIRECTLY in the pop-up window. After that, you will be able to record normally, and you will not have to take this step for any future recordings.



- ♦ You will have a 48-hour window to complete Chapter Tests. They are only accessible on the 2 weekdays following the deadline for the Speaking Assessment. Chapter Tests have a 90 minute time limit.
- ◆Chapter Tests have 50 questions, each worth 2 points. They contain a variety of audio, vocabulary and grammar questions on the chapter material in various formats: fill-in-the-blank, multiple choice, true-false, etc.
- ◆You may use the "Save & Exit" feature on Chapter Tests if you wish. Remember, however, that **you will only have**3 chances to <u>submit</u> for a grade. NOTE: Chapter Test questions are auto-graded and selected at random from test bank pools. If you click "Save & Exit", you will be able to build on previous work, BUT: each time you **submit** for a grade, the question pool will select a different set of randomized questions when you open it again on the 2nd or 3rd attempts if you submit more than once.
- ◆Each time you submit, you will receive your percent score, but no other information regarding which questions are right or wrong. Your definitive score in the gradebook will be the highest of all submissions made up to a maximum of 3, regardless of the order. (i.e., if your second submission was the highest score, that will be your definitive grade even if you scored lower on your most recent submission.)

Are the Midterm Exam and the Final Exam similar to Chapter Tests? Are there reviews?




- ◆The Midterm Exam and the Final Exam have the same types of questions as Chapter Tests, but each contains 100 questions rather than 50. The Midterm and the Final have a 3 hour time limit. The folders for these exams each contain Practice Activities to help you review the material. As with all Practice Activities, they are not counted as part of your grade.
- ♦ The Midterm Exam covers Chapters 1, 2 and 3. The Final Exam covers Chapters 4, 5 and 6.
- ◆Both the Midterm and the Final have a 48-hour window of accessibility. They have the same programming as Chapter Tests in terms of the number of submissions for a grade (3). For availability and due dates, see your Course Calendar.

What else is available on Connect from my main course page?

♦The "HOME" tab on *Connect* contains all of the previously described chapter work.

♦The "LIBRARY" tab on *Connect* contains **the content seen in the screen capture below**. This is where you will access




◆The "REPORTS" tab on *Connect* contains information about your scores, and **comments from your instructor for all manually-graded work** (Writing and Speaking Assessments.)

How can I study grammar on Connect?


♦ From the LIBRARY tab, open the E-BOOK.



♦ From the E-BOOK, click on the VIDEO tab. This contains all grammar tutorial videos for each chapter.



What other resources are there on Connect?



♦ From the LIBRARY tab, click on STUDENT RESOURCES to access the content seen in the screen capture above.

NOTES:

The grammar tutorials accessed from here are in individual files and cover the entire grammar content for the book. File format is either zip files or SWF for viewing online as in each individual chapter of the ebook.

How should I study? Is there a recommended itinerary?

♦ The order in which you complete your assignments should follow the order of the due dates for each chapter item. If you refer to the Course Calendar, you should work from "top to bottom" ---e.g., you should not attempt to do the writing or speaking assessments due at the end of the chapter before you have done all of the practice work, Workbook/Lab Manual, and *LearnSmart* Activities because these assessments test global comprehension and mastery of the grammar and vocabulary concepts that should be practiced first.

Suggested Itinerary for Each Chapter:

- FAMILIARIZE YOURSELF WITH THE CHAPTER CONTENT.
 Read over all chapter content in your textbook to get a feel for the vocabulary and grammar concepts taught.
- 2. VOCABULARY.

Study the new chapter vocabulary. Go over the words in your textbook, and then do the PRACTICE VOCABULARY activities so you can get answers and feedback.

- ◆Complete the LearnSmart Vocabulary module. This is your 1st due date for assigned work in each chapter.
- 3. GRAMMAR.

Continue with new chapter grammar. Study the grammar points in your textbook.

Watch the **Grammar tutorials** for the chapter in the Video section of your ebook. (See p. 10 of this syllabus.)

Do the PRACTICE GRAMMAR activities so you can get answers and feedback.

- ♦ Complete the *LearnSmart* Grammar module. This is your 2nd due date for assigned work in each chapter.
- 4. PRONUNCIATION. Complete the Practice Pronunciation activities.
- 5. WORKBOOK/LAB MANUAL.
 - ◆Complete all activities in the Workbook/Lab Manual. This covers what you have previously worked on in the Practice Activities and *LearnSmart*. This is your 3rd due date for assigned work in each chapter.
- 6. WRITING ASSESSMENT.
 - ♦ Complete the writing assessment. This is your 4th due date for assigned work for each chapter.
- 7. SPEAKING ASSESSMENT.
 - ♦ Complete the speaking assessment. This is your 5th due date for assigned work for each chapter.
- 8. CHAPTER TEST.
 - **♦Take the chapter test.** This is your **6th (final) due date** for assigned work for each chapter. Suggestion: Repeat the Practice Activities and *LearnSmart* modules for practice before taking the test.

REMEMBER:

Never leave completion of an assignment until the last few hours of the day of your due date.

Apart from the fact that you cannot learn the material properly if you do it that way, you might run into technical issues with your computer or Internet connection and not have enough time to resolve them.

- A grade of "C" or better in Spanish 1441 is a prerequisite for Spanish 1442.
- Spanish 1441 is a pre-requisite for Spanish 1442, 2313, and 2314. If you are currently enrolled in any other lower level Spanish course, you will be dropped from the higher level course.
- Note that for every credit hour earned, a student should spend three hours per week studying. Students enrolled in this course can expect to spend 9-12 hours per week of their own time in course-related study and assignments.

LATE REGISTRATION / CENSUS DATE / DROP POLICY

Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the **late registration period** which **ends on January 17th.** Students are required to make any course changes by **the census date**, **January 29th**.
