

Description of Course Content: This course is a detailed tour of the inner workings of the cell. From the structure and function of each organelle to how cells communicate. The material is linked to real world and current content whenever possible.

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Identify the major parts of the cell and explain key functions of each part. Build Structure to Function relationships.

- 2. Understand the fundamental physiological mechanisms of cell function.
- 3. Know the scientific methods that are currently being used to explore cell physiology.
- 4. Relate cell mechanisms to disease and dysfunction.

Each quiz will be worth 2% of your grade. Some questions from the exam will be taken from the quizzes, so take this seriously. There will be no practice questions or old exams given. The quizzes are the practice exams. There is no make up for missed quizzes.

Exams will have multiple choice questions and short answer/problem-solving questions. Exams are given on Tuesdays. Look at the schedule now and mark the days down. There is no make up for missed exams. The final is mandatory. The final grade can replace the lowest exam grade. This

will be determined after all the exams are taken, the calculations will be made and the best grade chosen for you by the program.

Exams will be returned on the Thursday or Tuesday after the exam. I will have the exams in class only once. The students TAs will have them in their office hours the following Wednesday.

Homework assignments will comprise of current event questions related to class topics that will be answered and discussed on the discussion board.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory for success in this course.

Other Requirements: Exercise critical thinking skills, do your own research, be in charge of your own learning, keep up with the reading and attend class without exception. We will also have a discussion board and keeping up with the discussion and questions on the board is also a part of this class.

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>9 hours</u> per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, going over the material, doing your own research and taking quizzes, preparing for exams, etc.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period.
