Description of Course Content: Pavement inventory; condition and structural evaluation techniques; serviceability concepts; deterioration modeling; maintenance vs. rehabilitation vs. reconstruction; economic considerations, selection of project alternatives and life cycle cost analysis.

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional $\underline{6(six)}$ hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.
