Time and Place of Class Meetings: Partner lessons (249) and Friday Studio Class (258) (Studio Class: 3:15pm-5:15pm for Performance Majors, 4:15-5:15 for Music Education Majors)

Description of Course Content: Applied flute lessons and studio class focus on all aspects of high quality musical performance including effective practice, excellent rhythm, beautiful sound, clear articulation, score study, listening, ensemble skills, intonation, pacing, stylistic awareness, stage presence and more. The specific course requirements are tailored by the instructor to meet the individual student's needs, but students of all majors and levels will be held to the same standard of *consistent improvement*.

Student Learning Outcomes: Each student should demonstrate *consistent improvement* through performances in lessons, studio class, juries and recitals as applicable. As a result of the student's commitment to incorporating guidance provided in lessons and continuously developing his/her own musical ability through dedicated practice, he/she will be able to perform in a more professional and effective manner.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations:

- 1 All items described in the UTA Lesson Book must be completed throughout the semester (during lessons, before Studio Class each week, and as recital attendance is completed). The Lesson Book should be turned in to Dr. Sánchez at the time of your jury OR, if you are performing a degree recital, by noon on the final day of classes (May 6^{th}).
- 2 Attendance at all scheduled partner lessons with individual assignments <u>thoroughly</u> prepared. Partner lessons enhance the learning experience by providing a more performance-oriented atmosphere, increased accountability, and the opportunity to learn about flute pedagogy. *Partners are assigned based on educational benefits and scheduling, not on student preference.*
- 3 Technique Jury during Studio Class. See individual assignments in Spring 2016 Lesson Book.
- 4 Performance in a jury or degree recital with all appropriate rehearsals arranged/attended.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required. Rather, each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, **I expect 100% attendance at all required events** with the only exception being illness, emergency, or academic conflicts with notice given **when the conflict arises** (i.e. not the day before an event when the schedule has been posted all semester).

Grading: A = Excellent, B = Good, C = Adequate, D = Substandard, F = Unacceptable/Incomplete

20% = Technique Jury

20% = Completed Lesson Book (including Recital Attendance)

30% = Lesson Performances (including etudes)

30% = Jury or Degree Recital Performance

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: As many practice hours as it takes to meet or exceed expectations outlined by the instructor in this syllabus, the Spring 2016 Lesson Book, and during applied lessons.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance**. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Final Review Week: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students

sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.

Emergency Exit Procedures: Should we experience an emergency event that requires us to vacate the building, students should exit the room and move toward the nearest exit, which is the main music department stairwell. When exiting the building during an emergency, one should never take an elevator but should use the stairwells. Faculty members and instructional staff will assist students in selecting the safest route for evacuation and will make arrangements to assist individuals with disabilities.
