Course Objective: To provide a fundamental understanding of both conventional and advanced testing techniques for the characterization of key stress-strain-strength-stiffness properties of geomaterials in the laboratory: one-dimensional consolidation, consolidation-swell, accelerometer resonant column, proximitor resonant column, conventional triaxial, ring shear, and true triaxial testing (time permitting).

Prerequisites: CE 3343 (Soil Mechanics), or consent of instructor.

Reference Textbook: NOT REQUIRED. (Class notes will be provided by Instructor.)

Major Assignments and Examinations: A series of <u>homework assignments</u>, <u>one</u> <u>midterm exam</u>, and <u>one comprehensive final exam</u>. All homework assignments must be turned in at the start of the class period in which they are due. Failure to do so will constitute a grade of zero for the homework assignment in question. <u>One week of</u> <u>advanced notice will be provided in scheduling the midterm exam</u>. The final exam will be given according to the university's published final exams schedule. Unexcused failure to appear for an exam at the scheduled time will constitute a grade of zero in that exam.

Grading Policy: Arithmetic average of all assigned homeworks (20%), Midterm exam (40%), Final exam (40%). <u>Final Grading Scale</u>: A: 90-100, B: 80-89, C: 70-79, D: 60-69, F: 59 or less.

Make-Up Exam Policy: No make-up exams will be given except for medical or other similar hardships where advanced arrangements are made with the instructor; or in case of non-selective medical emergencies with appropriate physician's note or documentation. Other than circumstances described above, failure to take the exam at the scheduled time will constitute a grade of zero in the exam.

Classroom Attendance Policy: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, <u>I will not track attendance or factor attendance into the grade</u>. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Laboratory Sessions: The course may involve a few sessions and demonstrations in the laboratory, during which the students may be required to collect and process experimental data by themselves. <u>Attendance to each laboratory session/demo is mandatory</u>. Unexcused failure to appear for a lab session/demo will constitute a grade of zero in the assigned homework corresponding to that session(s). All lab sessions/demos will be scheduled <u>on-campus</u> and <u>within regular class meeting times</u>. (Additional logistics will be discussed with students taking the class off the web.)

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. <u>Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance</u>. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Final Review Week: For semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate. Previously assigned work may have a completion date during Final Review Week, and materials covered in lectures during this week may be included in the final examination.
