<u>Time and Place of Class Meetings</u>: Mandatory <u>on campus</u> two-day simulation experience (in association with NURS 5316) April 19 and 20 at the Smart Hospital. Class will meet weekly online in Blackboard. While most class participation is asynchronous, some synchronous online activities may be required (see schedule at end of syllabus for dates/times of web conferences).

Description of Course Content:

Clinical management of the high-risk neonate with a focus on the perinatal and transition periods as well as stabilization of the ill newborn at birth. Includes fluid and electrolyte management, nutrition, and identification of the indications and complications associated with invasive skills and procedures relevant to the high-risk neonate.

Other Requirements: Prerequisite: NURS 5315. Co-requisite: NURS 5316.

As this course is offered in an online format, **each student must have a computer with a <u>high speed internet</u> connection**. This course requires the use of word processing software that is compatible with Microsoft Office formats. Students may purchase this software (in person or by mail) at a significant discount from the UTA bookstore http://www.bkstr.com/texasatarlingtonstore/home/en Students are required to have a webcam to participate in web conferences and to test online. Testing will be done online using Respondus browser and monitor (which students must download from a link within Blackboard and install on their computer). The instructor will determine what option is offered to students who are unsuccessful in completing a test online. Students may be required to complete an alternate version of the test using ProctorU for which students must pay a fee.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Apply theoretical and empirical knowledge of developmental physiology of the fetus and newborn to the transition to extrauterine life.
- 2. Assess, diagnose, and plan for the management of health care needs of the high-risk maternal/fetal client using evidence-based knowledge.
- 3. Develop plans for health promotion and disease prevention in the care of the high-risk maternal/fetal client within their family system.
- 4. Analyze patient selection criteria, pathophysiology, and indications/contraindications in the performance of invasive skills.
- 5. Demonstrate NNP-specific skills.

If a single author's ideas are discussed in more than one paragraph, the author must be referenced, according to APA format. Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end of the paper.
