Catalogue Description: Among the topics are Spanish or Latin American music, television, radio, film, and literature as culture. May be repeated for credit as topic changes. Prerequisite: SPAN 3315 with a grade of C or better. Offered as MAS 4313 and SPAN 4313; credit will be given for MAS 4313 or SPAN 4313 but not both in a given semester.

Spring 2017 topic: Biculturalism:

This semester we use this special topics class to examine the following questions:

- 1. How does crossing from one culture into another affect a person's identity?
- 2. What are the differences between being monocultural and being bicultural?
- 3. Besides biculturalism, what other terms can we use to talk about the identity of people who grow up or who are transformed by contact with more than one culture? Which is best?
- 4. What kind of prejudices do some writers bring to the topic of mestizaje or biculturalism?
- 5. How do we connect the literature and films on these topics with our own experiences in the twenty-first century?

Student Learning Outcomes:

- To follow instructions properly.
- To show advanced command of reading and writing skills in Spanish, such as spelling and good sentence structure, and to practice these skills through advanced reading, writing, and conversation.
- To command major themes of key works of Spanish and Latin American literature in the original Spanish (*Naufragios*, *El Laberinto de la Soledad*, *La Frontera*, among others.)
- To apply critical analysis strategies to literature and film.
- To connect cultural artifacts (documents, films, stories, etc.) with cultural and historical problems relating to our individual and social lives.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations:

Open notebook quizzes (7).	These are quizzes on assigned reading, or films, and on prior lectures by professor. Students are permitted to use their notebooks, or a print out from their laptops, but no screens are permitted.	The purpose of these pop quizzes is to verify that students are doing the assigned reading and work in the class. These are low danger assignments because students are permitted to use their notebooks. Each quiz will have one or more extra credit question to allow students who score less than a 100 to make up some lost points. The highest possible score on a quiz is 100.
Critical Papers (4)	Students write papers on topics covered in the class. For each paper, students will be able to choose from more than one topic or theme. Please see grading criteria below. Please review policy on late work.	These critical and somewhat creative papers will allow students to research, review, revise, and put their best work forward. Please see grading criteria below. Attendance:

My SPAN 4313-002 Policy: Students are permitted 3 absences without question. These absences are for family or medical emergencies. A 4th absence will constitute a final grade deduction of 6 points. A 5th absence will result in an 10 point deduction. A 6th absence is a 15 point deduction. A 7th absence is a 20 point deduction. Any student with 8 absences or more shall receive an F in the class, regardless of their performance on assignments, etc.

UTA Policy: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Grading Criteria and Grade Calculations: Students must demonstrate the following on their assignments:

- 1. Follow all instructions properly.
- 2. Command Spanish spelling and grammar at the 4000 level, not at a lower level.
- 3. Show comprehension of topic or text being explored.
- 4. Analyze (when required by the assignment) or synthesize clearly and with relative accuracy (when required by the assignment.)
- 5. Write clearly and understandably.
- 6. Show precision in reasoning and/or presentation of ideas.
- 7. Not engage in plagiarism or dishonesty of any kind.

Grade Calculations

Papers (4) x 15= 60 Quizzes (7) x 5.7= 40

Make-up Exams or papers and Tardy Work: If a paper is less than 24 hours late, it will be accepted but it cannot receive a grade higher than a B (85), even if it's excellent in every other respect. If a paper is more than 24 hours late, I will not accept it and it will receive a 0. Students may make up one missed paper if they meet the following criteria: no quiz score below a 75, and all other papers are turned in on time. Make-up paper may be on a different topic and will not be assigned until end of the semester. One quiz may be made up as long as all other quizzes are taken as assigned. Make-up quizzes will only be given in final two weeks of semester.

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>9</u> hours per week of their

own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.
