**Catalogue Description:** An examination of the mainstream genres and movements in European and Latin American literatures from 1600 to the present. Taught in English. Required for MA students in Modern Languages. May not be repeated for credit.

### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- Students command definition of major historical periods in relation to landmark works of French, Francophone, Spanish, and Latin American literary and intellectual history, and to a lesser degree film.
- Students convincingly connect major historical periods to landmark works of French, Francophone, Spanish, and Latin American literary and intellectual history, and to a lesser degree film.
- Students perform critical reading exercises in relation to landmark works of French, Francophone, Spanish, and Latin American literary and intellectual history, and to a lesser degree film. These include compare and contrast, tension, symbol, and the relationship between text and context.

- Students develop an understanding of the concepts of ambiguity, diversity, and complexity in relation to the interpretation of texts.
- Students become familiar with the research expertise of other faculty in Modern Languages.

Course Materials: Because students will be buying books in various languages, no books have been ordered through the bookstore. The major works students should procure in their language of preference are: Pedro Páramo by Juan Rulfo, René by Chateaubriand, The Flowers of Evil by Baudelaire, The House of Ulloa by Pardo Bazán, Lazarillo de Tormes by anonymous, and Candide by Voltaire. Other works will be provided on reserve.

# Descriptions of major assignments and examinations:

Assignment	<b>Description and Purpose</b>	Notes
Exams (midterm and final)	Students show command of key definitions and concepts.	For some essay questions, students will be given a choice to select one question from a category. One of the reasons for giving exams is that it's good practice for the Modern Langauges Master of Arts Examination.
Short Critical Papers (5)	Students write papers on assigned topics and readings.	It is key that students demonstrate critical thinking skills, rather than only summarizing plot. Strong organization and precision are also key.
Participation	Students should show engagement, not only with professor but with visiting experts who are coming to visit the class.	

**Attendance (Conway policy)**: Students are permitted 1 absence without question. Missing more than once may result in penalties such as deductions from final grade. Key: no student may miss more than two classes without a measurable consequence. At a minimum, preclusion from getting an A in the course, and at most point deductions.

**UTA Policy**: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her

own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

**Grading Criteria and Grade Calculations:** Students must demonstrate the following on their assignments:

- 1. Follow all instructions properly.
- 2. Command of key definitions and concepts (when requested by the writing prompt).
- 3. Show comprehension of topic or text being explored.
- 4. Analyze (when required by the assignment) or synthesize clearly and with relative accuracy (when required by the assignment.)
- 5. Write clearly and understandably.
- 6. Show precision in reasoning and/or presentation of ideas.
- 7. Not engage in plagiarism or dishonesty of any kind.

Please note: instructions for each writing assignment will be of paramount importance in setting expectations and standards of quality.

### **Grade Calculations**

5 short papers: 45% midterm: 25%

midterm: 25% final: 25

Participation: 5%

Make-up Exams or papers and Tardy Work: If a paper is less than 24 hours late, it will be accepted but it cannot receive a grade higher than a B (85), even if it's excellent in every other respect. If a paper is more than 24 hours late, I will not accept it and it will receive a 0. Students may make up one missed paper if they meet the following criteria: strong participation, and a score of B or higher on other papers. If a student misses an exam, he or she will have to justify the situation. In the event I provide a make-up, the exam will not be the same as the original one given and the student may have to take it at my convenience, not his or hers. This could result in the conferral of an incomplete. Don't miss any exams.

**Expectations for Out-of-Class Study**: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>9</u> hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.
