Course Description

This course introduces you to the field of semantics, focusing on the representation of meaning at the lexical level. This semester topics will include ways of describing meaning (sense and reference, componential analysis and prototype theory), ways of organizing meaning (the mental lexicon, connotation and euphemism, linguistic relativity), and ways of applying these concepts to sort predicates by argument strucure patterns.

The course serves the requirement for an upper division Linguistics course for the BA, or the minor in Linguistics, and can serve as an elective for MA students in Linguistics or in TESOL.

Course prerequisites: LING 3311 or permission of instructor.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successfully completing this course, students should be able to:

--describe and illustrate theories that have been proposed to describe the organization of the lexicon

--discuss linguistic literature that provides insight into practical applications of semantics as it interacts with other fields of linguistics

--describe and illustrate how denotation of words differs from connotation

--describe and illustrate which information is entailed in words

--provide and explain an analysis that shows how concepts are encoded

--provide individual examples of lexical relations and their patterns in a language

Course Requirements

1. Attend class regularly and take part in class discussions and in-class exercises.

2. Read chapters from the textbook and articles distributed in class and come to class prepared to discuss them.

3. Submit eight 3-page written exercises throughout the semester in which you practice the concepts discussed in class on your adopted word.

4. Submit a portfolio of revisions of your best three class homework assignments.

Required Course Material

There are two required sources of readings for this class:

--The book *Lexical Meaning (2001) by* M. Lynne Murphy. It is available at the UTA Bookstore, or through any bookseller of your choice, in eiher paperback or electronic form. (ISBN: 978-0-521-67764-6).

--We will also use a set of required articles that will be available online in the class Blackboard folder (https://elearn.uta.edu).

Course Policies

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I do have a policy that class attendance is **required**. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Assignments are due at the beginning of class on the day listed in the schedule, and no later. No late assignments will be accepted without PRIOR approval—please contact me if you're having difficulties, rather than skipping an assignment. Even approved late submissions will receive a reduction in points.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the
