**Description of Course Content:** This course is a study of medically important microorganisms. Special emphasis will be placed on recent advances in the molecular genetics of host pathogen interactions. This course will focus on the various strategies microorganisms use to attach, invade and multiply in a host. Knowledge of these mechanisms of pathogenesis is being used to develop prevention and treatment strategies for a number of diseases. We will use current literature and case studies to focus on selected model organisms that will introduce the major concepts in microbial pathogenesis.


Student Learning Outcomes: Microbes play a highly significant role in our daily lives as agents of infectious disease and are a major public health concern. The third edition of *The Microbial Challenge: A Public Health Perspective* addresses this topic and has been extensively revised and updated with the latest data in a fast-paced field. It focuses on human-microbe interactions and considers bacterial, viral, prion, protozoan, fungal and helminthic (worm) diseases. A chapter on beneficial aspects of microbes makes it clear that not all microbes are disease producers and that microbes are necessary for the sustenance of life on Earth. The response of the immune system, concepts of epidemiology, and measures of control from the individual to the international level to thwart potentially life-threatening epidemics are described. Sections on fungi and fungal diseases are new.

The intended **learning outcomes** are as follows. By the end of the course students should be able to;

- Explain relationships and apply appropriate terminology relating to the structure, metabolism, genetics, and ecology of prokaryotic microorganisms, eukaryotic microorganisms, and viruses.
- Explain interactions between opportunistic and pathogenic microorganisms and susceptible hosts in contacts that result in infection and/or disease and apply these interactions to disease symptoms.
- Explain innate and adaptive immune responses and apply this understanding to the infectious disease process as well as the prevention and control of infectious diseases.
- Explain principles of physical and chemical methods used in the control of microorganisms and apply this understanding to the prevention and control of infectious diseases.
- Demonstrate an appreciation and understanding of clinical laboratory skills and techniques related to the isolation, staining, identification, assessment of metabolism, and control of microorganisms.
- Interpret and draw appropriate conclusions from laboratory results.
- Analyze and distinguish therapeutic treatments for microbial infections, and distinguish when a vaccine, antibiotic, or other therapy is likely to be the most appropriate response.
- Specify the role of ecology and evolution in the spread of infectious diseases, comparing the role of transmission, population size and susceptibility, and virulence in endemic disease, epidemic disease, emerging diseases, and bioterrorism
- Develop the ability to work both independently and with others in teams and study groups.
- Develop an information base for making personal health decisions in regard to infectious diseases.

## Descriptions of major assignments and examinations: Final

course grades will be based on 2 exams spread across the semester and an in class presentation, or the final exam and an in class presentation. Grades will be calculated as follows: if you have taken Exams 1, 2 and an in class presentation and are satisfied with your grade, you do not need to take the <u>comprehensive</u> final exam. If you elect to take the final exam, your grade on the final exam and an in class presentation, or your grade on the first two (2) exams and an in class presentation, whichever is greater, will be the grade you earn for this course. The optional final exam gives a student an opportunity to "redeem" a poor exam 1 or 2 performance, or "replace" an unexcused missed exam. Please remember the final exam is COMPREHENSIVE and requires significantly more effort than the two (2) regular exams! Students are encouraged to study and complete the two exams during the regular course period and not depend on the final exam.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I strongly encourage students to attend all lectures. I allow students to attend class at their own discretion. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.
