Exploration of Science and Theories for Nursing

Course Description:

This course is a critical examination of the philosophical and theoretical bases for nursing science.

Course Outcomes:

At the conclusion of this study, the learner will be able to:

- **Describe** the history and philosophy of nursing science;
- Analyze concepts and their relationships for theory development;
- Evaluate theoretical frameworks for nursing research;
- <u>Apply</u> theories of population diversity and cultural competence to nursing education, administration, and advanced practice;
- <u>Apply</u> system and change theories to health care delivery, administration, and Education; and
- **Evaluate** usefulness of other theories from nursing and related disciplines to nursing practice, education, and administration.

<u>Credit Hours</u>: This is a three (3) hour credit course. N 5327 is a didactic, semester-long online course.

Descriptions of Major Assignments and Due Dates: Course Overview

Introduction

N 5327 Exploration of Science and Theories for Nursing is one of the core courses in the graduate program. The other two are research and evidence-based practice. This course is designed to enable you to become conversant with the science and theories for nursing. It is an introductory course that provides a pathway for the active learner to continue gaining knowledge about this important dimension of professional nursing.

Course Structure

N 5327 Exploration of Science and Theories for Nursing consists of eight (8) modules. Each module focuses on a different topic and extends for a two-week period. Assignments are due the **second week** of the module. See the Course Schedule. This sequence will keep you engaged in a progressive manner to continue building on the content from module-to-module. Further down, we'll take a brief look at each module.

Assignments

There are a total of **eight (8)** deliverables in this course. These are:

- One Discussion Board
- Reflective Journal (3 submissions)
- Quizzes (3)
- Evaluation of Middle Range Theory (Your choice)
- Evaluation of Betty Neuman's Systems Model
- Formal Professional Paper on Theory Description and Evaluation
- Nurse Interview
- Final Course Exam

I encourage you to read the whole Module content as you begin your study per Module. Pay attention to the: (1) Overview of the Module; (2) Guiding Questions;

- (3) Learning Objectives/Outcomes; (4) To-Do List and Assignments; (5) Readings; and
- (6) Lectures/Lessons.

• <u>Module 1</u>: Introduction to the History and Philosophy of Nursing Science Module 1 consists of three lessons. These lessons cover key terms in the study of science and theories of nursing. They also present a general overview of science and philosophical Schools of Thought with implications for nursing. A Summary of ways of knowing in nursing is also included.

At the end of this module, you will find **Guidelines for Substantive Posts/Online Discussion Participation**. This is a guidance tool for writing substantive online discussions.

Assignments for Module 1

Your first graded assignment is your submission of your *Personal and Professional Philosophy as a Nurse*. Refer to the assignment instructions, use the assignment template to fulfill the requirements for this assignment, and refer to the respective grading rubric. Write with *quality* versus *quantity* in mind. You will submit your initial thread on <u>Wednesday of Week 2</u> and reply to <u>two</u> peers by Saturday of Week 2. All assignments are due by 11:59PM of the due date.

• Module 2: An Overview of Theory in Nursing

Module 2 consists of seven lesson plans that present an overview of theory in nursing. It includes key terms in the study of theory, why study theory in nursing, the language of theories in nursing, characteristics of theories, implications of theory in nursing, and the evolution of theory development in nursing. This module traces the stages of the evolution of nursing from task-oriented functions of nursing to the identification of nursing as a profession.

• Assignments for Module 2

There are **two assignment submissions** in this module. One is the *Reflective Journal* **#1**. The second is **Quiz #1**. Follow the instructions for the Reflective Journal entries. Quiz #1 will cover the first four weeks of course material. You may study the Quiz Review notes to prepare for the Quiz. The Quiz consists of 15 questions: true or false; multiple choice, and multiple answer. The due date for these two activities is **Saturday**, **Week 4**, **11:59PM**.

• <u>Module 3</u>: Classification of Theories in Nursing and Theory Development Module 3 examines selected key terms in the study of theory, the scope of theory, types of theories, and the components of a theory. In addition, the relationship among theory, research, and practice is reviewed. Module 3 concludes with a brief review of approaches to theory development.

• Assignments for Module 3

There are **no assignments** to submit in Module 3. Use this time to prepare for your Quiz #2 and to work on upcoming assignments.

• Module 4: Overview of Middle Range Theories

Module 4 presents a more detailed overview of Middle Range Theories. It addresses the definition, purposes, and characteristics of Middle Range theories. Concepts and relationships for Middle Range Theory are also explored, including the categorization and development of Middle Range Theory.

• Assignments for Module 4

There are three (3) submission assignments for Module 4. These are: (1) evaluate/critique one Middle Range Theory of your choice; (2) submit your Reflective Journal #2; and (3) complete Quiz #2. All of these assignments are due Saturday, Week 8, 11:59PM. See corresponding templates and grading rubrics for the evaluation of the Middle Range Theory and the Reflective Journal, and study the Quiz Review for Quiz #2.

• <u>Module 5</u>: Overview of Evidence-Based Practice (EBP) & Theories From the Sociologic Sciences

Module 5 addresses two topics: an overview of EBP and theories from the sociological sciences. This overview includes examination of the definition and characteristics of evidence-based practice; critical features of EBP; concerns related to evidence-based practice in nursing; and theoretical modules of EBP. The review of theories from the sociological sciences covers some of the salient points of the General Systems Theory (GST), its basic tenets, and implications for nursing.

• Assignments for Module 5:

This module has <u>one assignment</u>. You will submit your critique/evaluation of the Betty Neuman Systems Model. See template and corresponding grading rubric. This assignment is <u>due Saturday</u>, <u>Week 10</u>, <u>11:59PM</u>.

• Module 6: Future Issues in Nursing Theory

The content of this module focuses on future issues in nursing theory. It covers some of the most salient implications for nursing science, nursing theory, nursing practice, nursing research, nursing leadership and management, and nursing education. We could not complete a study of nursing sciences and nursing theory without an examination of projections for the future.

• Assignments for Module 6

This module has <u>three (3) assignment submissions</u>. These are: (1) formal professional paper on a <u>Theory Description and Evaluation</u> of <u>one</u> of the theories you already examined in Modules 4 and 5. Select the theory of your choice from these two; (2) Reflective Journal #3; and (3) Quiz #3. These will be your last submissions of the Reflective Journal and the last Quiz. See the instructions for the formal paper, and study the Quiz #3 review notes. All assignments are <u>due Saturday, Week 12, 11:59PM</u>.

• <u>Module 7</u>: Nurse Interview/Assignment

You will conduct a fact-to-face interview with a professional nurse (with a minimum of a BSN) who is actively involved in his/her nursing career. The <u>purpose</u> of the interview is to examine how nursing theory has influenced the nurse's career. Refer to instructions for the interview, the template, and the grading rubric. This assignment is <u>due</u> <u>Saturday</u>, <u>Week 14</u>, 11:59PM.

• Module 8: Final Course Exam

Good News! The final course exam consists of a compilation of the previous 3 (three) short quizzes and a few additional questions from the last 4 (four) weeks. Study the Quiz Review for the Final Exam which covers all the material you will see on the final.

<u>Summary</u>

You will note that this course touches on selected topics on the subject of sciences and theory for nursing. It is not pretend to cover all there is to know about the topic. However, it does provide the learner with some handles to navigate the subject matter in a meaningful way with implications for the learner's professional nursing career development and continued growth.

- 2. FINAL: This SafeAssign location is separate and is the only one that will be graded. Only one document can be uploaded per SafeAssign. The document you upload to the FINAL dropbox is the one that will be graded, so be certain that it is the correct paper. The file name should have your last name and initial and short version of assignment name (example, TrevinoMpaper1.doc)

Consistent with APA format, if five or more words in sequence are taken from a source, those words must be placed in quotes and the source referenced with author's name, date of publication, and page number of publication. If the author's ideas are rephrased, by transposing words or expressing the same idea using different words, the idea must be attributed to the author by proper referencing giving the author's name and date of publication. If a single author's ideas are discussed in more than one paragraph, the author must be referenced, according to APA format. Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end of the paper. <u>Student Success Faculty:</u> In order to assist masters nursing students who are at academic risk or who need academic support, there are graduate faculty members available to you. The

goal of the success faculty members is to support student achievement in masters-level coursework so students can reach their educational goals. Students may contact a success faculty member directly, or a course instructor may encourage you to contact a success faculty member.

The success faculty in the MSN Program:

Dr. Donelle Barnes is available as a writing coach to assist students in the MSN Core courses; theory, research, and evidence based practice. Each student's feedback via the SFS database is aggregated with that of other students enrolled in the course. Students' anonymity will be protected to the extent that the law allows. Final Review Week: (May not apply to NP's) For semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.

This paragraph is only for 5313 – Students must pass both the didactic and lab portions of this course in order to pass the course. In order to pass the lab portion, the student must receive a passing grade (minimum of 80%) on the faculty evaluation of the student's lab performance. Students who fail a faculty evaluation have a one-time option to retake. A second faculty member will be present during the lab performance retake. If the student passes (minimum of 80%), the maximum grade the student can receive for the exam for purposes of grade calculations is 80%. If the student fails the retake, the student will receive a grade of "F" for the course.
