**Description of Course Content:** Practice in Spanish-language skills needed in the professional fields in order to communicate with Spanish-speaking individuals. Emphasis on specialized vocabulary building, role play, and an understanding of Hispanic culture. Topics may include Spanish for law enforcement, social services, education, medicine, business, and communications. Prerequisite: SPAN 2314 or SPAN 2315, or the equivalent, with a grade of C or better.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes:**

- Gain perspective of cross-cultural professional practices and professional etiquette in the United States, Latin America and Spain.
- Develop the ability to identify appropriate documentation resources and to be able to measure their reliability and to use them.
- Acquire and utilize specialized vocabulary in student-centered activities that simulate social and professional interactions (job interviews, etc.).
- Improve critical thinking skills through research and discussion of specialized texts and Internet resources.
- Make formal oral presentations on content-based material in a coherent and professional manner.
- Write technical documents using analytical and persuasive language, employing accurate grammar and structure.
- Develop interpersonal competence and the ability to work in groups.



In order to achieve this, students will:

- Learn how to handle a variety of communicative tasks using several verb tenses, as well as grammatical structures.
- Learn how to write about concrete and factual topics of personal and public interest informal and informal situations.
- Express and support ideas based on the information studied, as well as to express agreement
  or disagreement to interlocutor's arguments, and express counter points effectively and
  persuasively.
- Develop ability to adapt language use to a variety of social situations and/or modes of communication (email vs. formal paper, for example).
- Control common, general vocabulary, as well as some specialized terminology.

- Students are responsible for the reading to be discussed in class. Students will be asked to prepare written answers about the assigned reading and turn them in via Blackboard.
- All homework must be typed (Times New Roman 12) and double-spaced.
- The professor reserves the right to collect and grade homework at any point throughout the semester.
- No late homework will be accepted.
- Students should be prepared to interact in class.
- This class will also require significant amounts of memorization to learn the active vocabulary.
- Students will review the theoretical concepts debated in class and be able to discuss them.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this course, I have established the following attendance policy. Attendance is mandatory. After two absences the student's grade will be lowered 2% for each absence. Participation is mandatory; if the student doesn't participate on a daily basis his/her grade will be affected significantly. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final



grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

**Other Requirements:** Common Courtesy. Please do not enter class late. Every third tardy (10 minutes late) will count as one absence. *Please, turn off your cell phone before entering class*.

**Make-up Exam Policy:** There are no make-up exams except in cases of demonstrable emergencies.

**Expectations for Out-of-Class Study**: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional **6 hours** per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, research, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.

**Drop Policy:** Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. **Final Review Week:** for semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.
