### **Course Description:**

In this course we will be exploring contemporary representations of Jesus in fiction and film to consider what this figure has come to mean in both secular and religious thinking today. While Jesus has historically been presented as the ultimate

heroic figure in Western thought, most popular entertainment and some popular fundamentalist movements celebrate violent heroism rather than pacifism-is this new? Or, has there always been this seeming split? We will begin the course by reading the Gospels (including sections of some of the gnostic Gospels) and then look at what writers since Paul have had to say about Jesus as a historical and inspirational figure. We will read **two novels** along with **two films** and **several** essays and short stories, as

well as **the biblical Gospels** in order to examine how the figure of Jesus seems to change from writer to writer and era to era and what these changes might mean.

### Requirements

### **Main Texts**

King James Version of the *Bible* (analog or electronic versions)

Memoirs of Pontius Pilate by James R. Mills

Dune by Frank Herbert

(We will also read and discuss a number of stories and critical essays that I will give to you to you in class)

### Daily Quizzes (25%)

Each class day there will be a quiz of 5 to 10 short-answer questions about the readings for the day. The quiz will be given during the first five minutes of the class period. Students who are tardy will not be able to make up the quiz if it is missed.

Midterm Exam (25%)

#### Research Essay (25%)

Students will write a final research essay (2,500 words) that proposes an original thesis, is well argued and supported by research. All research materials will come from scholarly books, journals, microfiche, and audio/video recordings that may be found in the library.

### **Objectives:**

- •Through examination, writing assignments, reviews, and class discussions, you will be assessed on your ability to accomplish the following:
- •To understand how traditional and modern scholarship interprets texts regarding the historical Jesus.
- •To understand how the teachings, deeds, and personality of the historical Jesus have exerted a hold on the imagination of creative writers and filmmakers over time, and in the modern era in particular.
- •To understand and be able to critically evaluate the different literary responses to the place of messianic figures in a pluralistic world.

•To develop and be able to critically express scholarly ideas considering the cultural impact of the Gospels in fiction and film.

### A note on texts:

You will be expected to have all of the books for this course by the beginning of the second week of classes. All of these books are available at local bookstores and amazon.com.

Not having a book for class because the university bookstore did not have it when you checked will not excuse you from scheduled assignments.

The texts we will be reading are all currently available in print and are widely sold in most bookstores and book websites, as well as downloadable versions for smartphone and tablet devices.

### **Class Policy Statement:**

- •Regular attendance and participation in class discussion is expected. You are allowed three (3) excused absences. Upon the fourth absence I will fail you due to absences.
- •Once the door to the classroom closes at the beginning of class, it will automatically lock and I will not open it again until the class is over. So be in class on time!

### **Boilerplate:**

While UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. **Final Review Week:** for semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.
