Time and Place of Class Meetings: TR 9:30-10:50; TH 200.

Description of Course Content: An interdisciplinary introduction to Latin American society, history and culture. Prerequisite: SPAN 2314 with a grade of C or better. Offered as MAS 3312 and SPAN 3312; credit will be granted for either MAS or SPAN.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Identify major historical periods, key topics, and historical actors important to modern Latin American and Latino history and culture *through engagement with period sources (non-fiction, literature, film etc.), classroom discussion, and tests.*
- Apply close-reading strategies to literary and cultural texts *through homework and classroom exercises*, *and formal paper assignments*.
- Draw connections between cultural artifacts (documents, films, stories, etc.) and cultural and historical problems relating to the Latin American and Latino experience *through classroom discussion, tests, and formal paper assignments*.
- Develop an appreciation of the experience of women in Latin American and Latino history and culture *through the study of major works of literature by women*.
- Practice reading and writing skills in Spanish through homework and writing assignments.

Open notebook tests (4). Blackboard Gradebook abbreviation: ONT (Open Notebook Test) And THP (Take Home Portion). February 1 & 27, April 3 & 26	These are short in-class tests on assigned reading, or films, and on prior lectures by professor. Students are permitted to use their paper notebooks during the test but no screens are permitted (phones, laptops, tablets etc.) It's possible that some tests may have a take home portion to be completed on BB before the next class session. (These take-homes will be listed in gradebook as THP [take home portion.])	The purpose of these tests is to verify that students are doing the assigned reading and work in the class. These are low danger assignments because students are permitted to use their notebooks. These papers have two purposes: to allow language learners to practice their writing in Spanish; and to extend classroom discussions and thinking to new texts or media. This will allow students to further consolidate knowledge on a particular topic.
Creative Project (1) Blackboard Gradebook abbreviation: CP April 17, 2018	Students prepare one of the following options, in English or Spanish: a) a video research project (no longer than 10 minutes); or b) an audio podcast (no longer than 10 minutes.) Please note that two students may work together on the same project for the same grade. Three or more students are not permitted.	The purpose of multimedia projects is to allow students to combine technology with research. It's also designed to allow students to be creative and produce a narrative of some kind for others to appreciate.
Attendance	See full policy in syllabus (below). Students begin with 100 for Attendance. As absences accumulate, I deduct points from this grade category.	By enforcing attendance, I reward students who are diligent, I maintain morale, and create an atmosphere of professionalism.

UTA Attendance Policy:

At the University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance.

Attendance Policy set by Dr. Conway for SPAN 3312:

As the instructor of this course I have set the following policy:

Each student will begin with a 100 for their attendance in Blackboard Gradebook. As classes are missed, points will be deducted as indicated below.

You are allowed 3 absences no questions asked. These are for family emergencies and medical emergencies. They are not vacation time, on top of which you can add family emergencies or medical problems. Your fourth absence triggers a 10 point deduction from your participation and attendance grade of 100. Your fifth absence triggers another 10 point deduction from your participation and attendance grade of 90, taking it down to 80. Your sixth absence triggers a higher point of deduction; from 80 points I will deduct 20 points, taking it down to 60. Your seventh absence is another 20 point deduction, taking it down to 40. The eighth absence will result in a 0 for the attendance grade category. A ninth absence will result in an additional penalty: deducting 5 points from the final grade. Further absences will result in more deductions from final grade.

I am willing to excuse the fourth absence in extreme situations, but I will need documentation and a face to face meeting. Beyond that, the above rules apply, regardless of the legitimacy of the reasons for being absent.

With regards to tardiness, every tardy beginning with the third one will count as a ½ absence.

Weather and Attendance:

I reserve the right to cancel class in the case of the extreme inclement weather even if the University has not shut the university down. I will communicate this decision via Blackboard and/or email to the entire class. Your safety is my priority. Here, "extreme inclement weather" is defined as ice storms, snow storms, black ice on roadways, and tornado-like conditions or extreme rain events. I also reserve the right to excuse students who are absent due to weather related problems.

Classroom Behavior Policy: I require everyone to behave professionally and respectfully.

Grading Criteria:

My criteria for grading homeworks, papers, and exams hinge on (1) Following all instructions properly; (2) Quality of Spanish spelling and grammar; (3) Clarity of written Spanish; (4) The substance, originality or depth of analysis (when relevant to assignment); (5) Comprehension of material covered; and (6) Organization of ideas. Outstanding work does not only meet criteria but exceeds them in most regards, most notably for its creativity, depth, complexity, and quality of organization and Spanish.

Understanding your grade:

Open Notebook Tests (4) 4 x 12%= 48% of final grade

Open Notebook Take Home Portion 4 x 1%= 4% of final grade

Short Papers (2) 2 x 15% = 30 % of final grade

Creative Project (1)= 10% of final grade

Attendance and Participation= 8% of final grade

Students are expected to keep track of their performance throughout the semester and seek guidance from available sources (including the instructor) if their performance drops below satisfactory levels; see "Student Support Services," below.

Make-up Exams and Tardy Work:

If a student misses a test, he or she may make it up, beginning in week 10. No excuses or documentation required. I ask no questions and make no judgments. That is why I have this policy. Only one make-up is permitted. In order to qualify for a make-up students must have no more than 5 absences and must have at least a 65 in the other tests taken.

Late papers will not be accepted. If a student misses a paper, he or she may make it up, beginning in week 10. No excuses or documentation required. I ask no questions and make no judgments. That is why I have this policy. Only one make-up is permitted. In order to qualify for a make-up students must have no more than 5 absences and must have at least a 75 in the other paper(s) written.

My guiding principles on these matters is: flexibility is important because we all face challenges in our lives sometimes; flexibility has limits, it's not the same thing as every rule or condition is subject to change; and accomodation, when offered to a student who is not covered by a disability accomodation, is a privilege that is earned based on his or her performance and classroom comportment. Should there be a request for an exception to the make-up policy above, and I decide to consider the request, I would only implement it with the above principles in mind. I have a responsibility to the entire class to create structure and enforce it. By remaining in the class, students agree to abide by my class policies.

Course Contract: On the first day of class, students will be asked to sign a course contract to help avoid misunderstandings throughout the semester. Failure to complete this course contract on the first day of class, or upon the professor's request, may result in a modest point deduction from the final grade. (2-3 points.)

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>9</u> hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.

If we cannot exit through the front door we will exit through the side door, by the professor's computer station.
