Description of Course Content

In this class we will be studying some of the ways in which the context and form of an utterance interact to affect speaker's intended meaning beyond literal word meaning. Our main topics this term will include reference, deixis, implicature, presupposition, speech acts, and the signaling of information structure through word order.

This class has no prerequisites. For linguistics MA and PhD students in Linguistics, this course is the one of the Meaning and Use core requirements. For students in the MA or Certificate in TESOL the course can count as an elective or as the sociolinguistics/pragmatics credit.

This is a graduate-level course with two objectives:

- to provide practice in analyzing the impact of truth conditions, context, and speaker intention on the interpretation of meaning.
- to provide practice reading and discussing linguistic topics on pragmatics in order to gain insight into both theoretical aspects and practical applications of conveying meaning in communication.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successfully completing this course, students should be able to:

identify and explain basic questions investigated in pragmatics in order to situate the

core issues of context-dependent meaning

- describe and illustrate how presuppositions can be identified in language
- describe and illustrate how hearers can calculate an indirect speech act and a conversational implicature
- describe ways in which speaker expectations about meaning created through interlocutor interaction could affect cross-cultural conversations and second language instruction
- show that you can find, assess, contribute, and cite verifiable definitions and references in order to build up wiki pages on designated topics in pragmatics


Required Course Materials
