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

3311-001 Medical Mycology



Student Learning Outcomes: The goal of this course is to prepare students for professional careers that employ the principles of medical mycology. This will be accomplished through the mastery of the following specific objectives:

- Discover how other disciplines contributed to the study of mycotic diseases;
- Recognize the etiology of different mycoses;
- Learn the fundamental basis for diagnosing fungal infections;
- Differentiate the different pathologies of the mycoses;
- Identify environmental and host factors that promote fungal infections;
- Comprehend the various treatment regimens for the mycoses;
- Appreciate the role of fungi in human affairs;
- Recognize the importance of proper public dissemination of information; and
- Understand the contributions of fungi to current concepts in infectious disease

Assessment of Student learning outcomes may include:

- Performance on multiple choice examination questions
- Performance on short answer essay questions included on each examination
- Performance on take home examinations



Descriptions of major assignments and examinations with due dates: Exams are scheduled for the following dates:

Grading Policy: Final course grades will be based on 2 exams spread across the semester, **or** the final exam. Grades will be calculated as follows: if you have taken Exams 1 and 2 and are satisfied with your grade, you do not need to take the <u>comprehensive</u> final exam. If you elect to take the final exam, your grade on the final exam or your grade on the first two (2) exams, whichever is greater, will be the grade you earn for this course. The optional final exam gives a student an opportunity to "redeem" a poor exam 1 or 2 performance, or "replace" an unexcused missed exam. Please remember the final exam is COMPREHENSIVE and requires significantly more effort than the two (2) regular exams! Students are encouraged to study and complete the two exams during the regular course period and not depend on the final exam.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I strongly encourage students to attend all lectures. I allow students to attend class at their own discretion. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Make-up Exams: Make-up exams will be allowed only in <u>extreme circumstances at the discretion of the Instructor</u>. You should have a doctor's note in case of illness. Notify me (by email, phone, note etc. AS SOON AS you are aware of a problem, <u>prior to the exam</u>. <u>Missed exams will receive a score/grade of zero "0".</u>

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional **9** hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for each new lecture at least the day before the lecture.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Final Review Week: for semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.

Emergency Exit Procedures: Should we experience an emergency event that requires us to vacate the building, students should exit the room and move toward the nearest exit, which is located at the nearest end of the hallway, to the right, as one exits the classroom. When exiting the building during an emergency, one should never take an elevator but should use the stairwells.
