## Catalaog Description of SPAN 3320: INTRODUCTION TO HISPANIC LITERATURE AND

**CULTURE.** An introduction to the tools of literary and cultural criticism as well as Spanish and Latin American literary history. Study of representative literary texts with the object of developing students' understanding of historical change and cultural crosscurrents. Prerequisite: <u>SPAN 3315</u> with a grade of C or better. **SPRING 2019 Topic:** Literature and Psychology.

- 1. Master writing skills in Spanish (specifically spelling) through *classroom workshops*, *groupwork*, *homework and writing assignments*.
- 2. Apply close-reading and critical thinking strategies to literature through *homework and classroom exercises, and formal paper assignments.*
- 3. Develop strategies for organizing ideas for effective communication through *classroom workshops, groupwork, homework and writing assignments.*

### **OVERVIEW OF ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADE WEIGHTS**

#### Tardy Work and Make-up Policies:

#### Tardy

See table above for tardy work rules for Critical Responses and Homeworks. Assignments turned in 24 hours or less late have their grades capped but are accepted. Assignments turned in after 24 hours are not accepted and get a 0.

I need our class to be in order. My rule of thumb is this: if you work hard most of the time, have a good attitude, and meet deadlines most of the time, then you <u>earn</u> the right to a make-up for a missed assignment. I will not base decisions on make-ups on whose excuse sounds better than another person's. I will use concrete, objective criteria, outlined below.

I will accommodate students if they miss one homework, quiz, or writing assignment as long as the following conditions are met:

- 1. Prior to week 13, no more than three absences.
- 2. All other quizzes and assignments prior to week 13 are met or turned in on time.
- 3. Good record of participation and engagement and professional behavior in class.

If these conditions are met, the make-up will be accepted in Week 14.

#### Missed Midterm Exam

If a student misses the midterm, he or she will only be eligible to make it up if they have a valid reason and a good record in the class. I will determine if the reason is valid and "good record" means

- 1. Tarea 1 turned in on time, passing grade
- 2. Comentario 1 turned in on time, grade of 75 or higher
- 3. Grade of 75 or higher on Quiz 1 and 2
- 4. No more than 2 absences prior to midterm
- 5. Student has participated in classroom discussions and been cooperative

If these conditions are met, the make-up of the midterm will take place at my convenience and may cover some extra material.

#### Missed Final Exam

If a student misses the Final, and they have not missed the midterm, and they have not missed more than one other assignment, and they have a valid reason that's reported within 24 hours of the Final Exam, *they will get an incomplete in the course instead of a final course grade*.

The student will then be eligible to take a make-up after the end of the semester and have their grade changed. I will set a firm May or June deadline for the make-up. Missing that deadline means that the student will have their final grade recalculated from an incomplete into whatever it would be with a "0" for the Final exam.

For situations more extreme than what I outline above, students should meet with me.

**Course Subject Matter Notification:** This course deals with mature subject matter. The literature and films to be explored contain references to sexuality and violence. Although occassional accommodation may be possible (trigger warnings), students who believe they cannot generally handle these themes should consider taking a different course. The course also touches on LGBTQ themes. Students are required to maintain a respectful and academic composure in classroom discussions and written work on these topics. If they cannot, they should consider taking a different course.

**Course Subject Matter and Politics:** This course is an exercise in intellectual, cultural, and historical enquiry, not an argument in favor of any ideology or specific viewpoint. Students are not assessed on opinions or personal views but on arguments, their ability to think analytically, and the shape and form of their scholarly communication.

**Policy on Incompletes for 3320:** Incompletes will only be granted if the student has completed 60% or more of their grade.

**Cost of Films Assigned:** I will be assigning some films in this course. Some may be freely available on YouTube but others will require a nominal streaming fee of \$2.99 or \$3.99 from a service like Itunes, YouTube, GooglePlay, Vudu, etc. When possible, I will put DVDs of some of these films on reserve in the Language Acquisition Lab on the Third Floor of Trimble Hall. See BB for details.

**UTA Attendance Policy:** At the University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance.

Attendance Policy for SPAN 3320 : You are allowed 3 absences no questions asked. <u>These are for</u> <u>family emergencies and medical emergencies</u>. Your fourth absence triggers a 1-point deduction from your final course grade. Your fifth absence triggers another 2-point deduction in addition to the existing 1-point deduction. Your sixth absence triggers a 10-point total deduction from your final grade. Your seventh absence is a 15-point deduction from your final grade. The eighth absence will result in a 20-point deduction from your final grade. I am willing to excuse the fourth absence in extreme situations, but I will need documentation and a face to face meeting. With regards to tardiness, every tardy beginning with the third one will count as a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> absence.

Weather and Attendance: I reserve the right to cancel class in the case of extreme inclement weather even if the University has not shut the university down. I will communicate this decision via Blackboard and/or GroupMe and/or email to the entire class. Your safety is my priority. Here, "extreme inclement weather" is defined as ice storms, snow storms, black ice on roadways, and tornado-like conditions or extreme rain events. I also reserve the right to excuse students who are absent due to weather related and traffic problems.

**Classroom Behavior Policy:** Students are required to maintain professional and respectful conduct at all times. This includes but is not limited to the following behaviors: (1) In their statements and and publicly visible behaviors, students must be respectful of different viewpoints and of each other in general; (2) In their statements and publicly visible behaviors, students are required to be respectful of me; (3) *Excessive* use of smartphone, tablet, or laptop screens during class for purposes that are visibly unrelated to classroom business is not permitted; (4) Repeated tardiness is improper; (5) Crosstalking during class or passing notes is also improper. With regards to other behaviors not listed here, I will use the following principle: if a visible and public behavior communicates disregard for our classroom business, that behavior should cease. Behaving in a dismissive or hostile manner is not appropriate. Every single one of us is tasked with maintaining, at the very minimum, a neutral and collaborative attitude or demeanour while in class together. I will notify students of any concern regarding their conduct once, in person and/or in writing. Failure to rectify behaviors will result in my reporting the student to the Office of Student Conduct at UT Arlington.

**Grading Criteria:** My criteria for grading homework, papers, and exams hinge on (1) Following all instructions properly; (2) Quality of Spanish spelling and grammar; (3) Clarity of written Spanish; (4) The substance, originality or depth of analysis (when relevant to assignment); (5) Comprehension of material covered; and (6) Organization of ideas. Outstanding work does not only meet criteria but exceeds them in most regards, most notably for its creativity, depth, complexity, and quality of organization and Spanish.

**Course Contract:** On the first day of class, students will be asked to sign a course contract to help avoid misunderstandings throughout the semester.

**Expectations for Out-of-Class Study**: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>6</u> hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.
