Course Description

This course introduces basic concepts, findings, issues, and research methods in sociolinguistics. Content includes key areas of sociolinguistic theory, as well as topics such as linguistic variation and change, code switching, politeness, ethnographic method, language planning and standardization, and pidgins and creoles.

This class meets the sociolinguistic requirement for the TESOL Certificate and earlier programs for the MA in Linguistics or in TESOL and serves as an elective in the current MAs or the Ph.D. in Linguistics. There is no prerequisite for the course.

Course Objectives

This graduate-level course is intended to help you achieve three objectives:

- Acquiring the knowledge and vocabulary to discuss (both orally and in writing) current and past approaches to investigating the interaction of individuals, social groups, and their various ways of using language.
- Practice in reading sociolinguistic literature in order to gain insight into both the kinds of questions asked in this field and typical ways of researching the answers.
- Learning to construct and evaluate investigations that aim to discover attitudes toward linguistic forms, their distribution, interpretation, and valuation.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successfully completing this course, students should be able to:

- identify and describe key concepts and objects of study from sociolinguistic theory.
- identify ways that language and identity are expressed in a multicultural society like the U.S.
- explain how various factors in a society correlate with language variation.
- distinguish identity factors that play a role in influencing language use.
- collect primary discourse data and analyze this data in light of sociolinguistic theory.

Required Materials

There are two forms of required readings. The first is the textbook:

Supplementary books for additional background reading are on reserve at the UT Arlington Central Library as well. You can search for them under my last name or the course number.

Course Policies

Regular attendance is expected in class, and your presence and thoughtful participation is included as part of the course grade. For each class, students will be expected to have completed prior to class the readings for each day's topic and any assigned problems to be discussed. Students assume responsibility for acquiring all notes, handouts, and announcements.

Assignments are due at the beginning of class, on the day listed in the schedule, and no later. No late assignments will be accepted without PRIOR approval by the instructor.

Course Requirements

Grades will be determined as follows:

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| 1. Active class participation (including attendance in class and at the library resources demonstration) | 10% |

| 4. Oral presentation on the initial findings of your final paper, to be presented in the 14 th or 15 th week of class. | 5% |
| 5. One 15-page written term paper, due in exam week. | 25% |

Important Academic and Administrative Policies

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance.** Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing.
