Descripción del curso

En este curso se estudian las obras pertenecientes a los siglos XVIII, XIX y XX que bien son escritas por mujeres o abordan temas donde la mujer es eje central. Estas obras se estudiarán dentro de su contexto histórico y social explicando y analizando l@s principales autor@s, tendencias y obras de la literatura española en conexión con las corrientes más influyentes de la literatura universal.

Objetivos

- Conocer l@s autor@s y las obras más sobresalientes de la literatura española del siglo XVIII, XIX y XX.
- Conocer las características esenciales de los periodos y movimientos literarios de los siglos XVIII, XIX y XX.
- Analizar y valorar críticamente las obras estudiadas.

Formato de las clases

En esta clase se valorará muy positivamente la intervención y participación activa de los estudiantes. Es obligatorio que los estudiantes asistan a clase habiendo realizado una lectura comprensiva de las obras asignadas para cada semana. A discreción de la profesora, ésta podrá entregar preguntas sobre las lecturas que deben ser contestadas a priori o proporcionar controles de lectura en clase. Cada cuestionario o control de lectura que no se realice satisfactoriamente afectará de forma negativa a la calificación final.

La clase se presentará de dos formas, de un lado mediante la exposición magistral de la profesora y mediante las exposiciones orales y participación de los alumnos y alumnas.
