Course

Objectives: Accounting is the process of identifying, measuring, recording and communicating economic

information to permit informed judgments and decisions by users of the information. This course is an introduction to the basic concepts, principles and procedures of U.S. **financial accounting.** Financial accounting is focused on the preparation of reports for use by persons outside a firm-- primarily

investors, potential investors and creditors. _

Course

Description:

This course covers the theory and practice of measuring and interpreting financial data for business units. Basic concepts, principles, and procedures are applied to the following topics: operating cycle, accruals and deferrals, financial statements, internal controls, receivables, inventory, fixed assets, liabilities, stockholders equity and statement of cash flows.

Student Learning

Outcomes:

The primary learning objectives of this class are to:

- Master basic business vocabulary.
- Become familiar with the fundamental concepts underlying financial accounting, and the legal and regulatory environment in which accounting rules are promulgated.
- 3) Learn how to prepare and analyze the Income Statement, Statement of Stockholders' Equity/Statement of Retained Earnings, Balance Sheet, and Statement of Cash Flows. These are the four basic financial statements.
- 4) Develop a basic understanding of how financial accounting information is used to make business decisions, including and understanding of some of the strengths and weaknesses of such accounting information, as well as ethical issues that can arise.
- Become familiar with the nature and content of a corporation's annual report to stockholders.
- 6) Understand that accounting is not "black and white." Judgment is involved in the choice of accounting methods, use of estimates, design of internal controls and resolution of ethical issues.

In order to enroll in Acct 3311 Intermediate Accounting, you will either need to: (1) score in the top 1/3 of your section's Common Final Examination and earn a B in the course, or (2) pass an entrance examination based mostly on the topics covered in this course. Grades

There will be six regular exams and a final exam (departmental comprehensive exam). Failure to complete the exams on the exam date and time will result in a "0". However, in cases where you have a proper reason approved by me in advance and supporting documentation, a make-up examination may be given. However, this examination must be taken within the time frame described below.

If you miss Examinations 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 you have the option to make-up the examination before the next class meeting after the original examination date. You must schedule a make-up time with me. All students are required to take the final examination. The Common Final Examination will be administered at the date and time listed in this syllabus.

I will provide all scratch paper for examinations. You cannot use any of your own paper. If your phone rings or if you use your phone in any way during an examination, your examination will be picked up and you will be required to leave the room. Your grade will be based on the amount of work you have completed. I reserve the right to seat or reseat any student before or during an examination.

Class attendance and lateness policies will be discussed during the first week of class. No student will be dropped from the class rolls for absences.

A student may drop a course with a grade of "W" until the two-thirds point of the semester, session, or course offering period. A student may drop a course after that point only upon approval of the appropriate official. A student may request an exception to the late drop policy by submitting a "Petition for Late Drop or Withdrawal" request. The last day to drop for the Fall 2013 semester is October 30, 2013. Repeating A Course: Students who enrolled in a Texas public institution of higher learning as a first-time freshman in fall 2007 or later are permitted to drop no more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This limit includes all transfer work taken at a Texas institution of higher education and to second baccalaureate degrees. <u>College Policy:</u> Students who have not paid by the census date and are dropped for non-payment cannot receive a grade for the course in any circumstances. Therefore, a student dropped for non-payment who continues to attend the course will not receive a grade for the course. Emergency loans are available to help students pay tuition and fees. College of Business Bomb Policy:

Section 22.07 of the Texas Criminal Law states that a Class A misdemeanor is punishable by (1) a fine not to exceed \$4,000, (2) a jail term of not more than one year, or (3) both such a fine and confinement. If anyone is tempted to call in a bomb threat, be aware that UTA will soon have technology to trace phone calls.

Every effort will be made to avoid cancellation of presentation/tests caused by bomb threats to the Business Building. Unannounced alternate sites will be available for these classes. If a student who has a class with a scheduled test or presentation arrives and the building has been closed due to a bomb threat, the student should immediately check for the alternate class site notice which will be posted on/near the main doors on the south side of the Business building.
