Course Syllabus – mer 2013 CE 2312 : Statics and Dynamics

Instructor: Mostafa Ghandehari

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Office Hours: M, W 3:00-5:30 p.m., Tues. 3:00-5:00 p.m. and by appointment.

Course Content: The lecture covers principles of forces and force systems, resultants and components of force systems, forces due to friction, condition of equilibrium, forces acting on members of trusses and frame structures, centroids and moments of inertia, review of kinematics and kinetics of particle motion, two-dimensional motion of rigid bodies. The lab period is used for reinforcement of the course principles through problem solving .

Student Learning Outcomes:

The objective of this course is to prepare students for courses dealing with engineering design of components and systems based on the fundamentals of statics and dynamics.

Requirements: PHYS 1443; MATH 2425 or concurrent registration therein. Student must enroll in the appropriate corresponding lab section (see Class Schedule).

Required Textbooks: Engineering Mechanics, Statics & Dynamics, by R. C. Hibbeler, 13th Edition. Prentice Hall

Major assignments and examinations:

Homework is due at the beginning of class. Late homework is not accepted. Write on one side only. You may do more than one problem per sheet. Staple the papers together at upper left corner. You can use instructor's office hours to get hint for difficult problems after you have thought about problems. Writing your homework in an organized and clear matter will enhance your learning of the subject.

Two quizzes based on homework. Quizzes are given at the beginning of class the day they are scheduled and have a maximum of 20 minutes allowed. Dates of quizzes will be given at least one week in advance.

Two midterm exam and a final examination. Dates of exams will be given at least a week in advance. Final Exam is Comprehensive.

Homework 10% Two Quizzes 10% Two Midterms 50% final Examination 30% Course grades are assigned based on the following percentages: F 0-59, D 60-69, C70-79, B 80-89, A 90-100.
