# **INTERMEDIATE LOGIC**

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**Course Description:** In this course we cover some of the basic metatheorems of Propositional and First-Order Predicate Logic, the rudiments of Axiomatic Set Theory, First-Order Theories with Identity, Second-Order Logic, and Modal Propositional Logic. The emphasis will be on the philosophical uses and significance of Logic and the place of Logic in the history of Mathematics and Computer Science. We will also informally discuss Gödel's Incompleteness Theorems, Multivalued Logics, the paradoxes of Self-Reference and Naïve Set Theory, the nature of mathematical proof and axiomatization, and the relation of Logic to the problems of Artificial Intelligence, the Philosophy of Mind, and the Philosophy of Mathematics.

**Prerequisites:** PHIL 2311 (Logic) or two mathematics courses

### **Required Text:**

Logical Options: An Introduction to Classical and Alternative Logics by John L. Bell, David DeVidi, and Graham Solomon, Broadview Press, 2001.

The text should be available at the UTA Bookstore.

#### **Evaluation:**

There will be multiple quizzes, some homework exercises, and two exams. Attendance and participation will also figure into the final grade.

Attendance: If you have three unexcused absences, you cannot get a higher grade than a B in this class. If you have four unexcused absences, a C is the highest possible grade. If you have five, a D. If you have six, you cannot pass. In order for an absence to be excused you must provide me with documentation demonstrating that your absence was for a legitimate reason.

*Quizzes and Homework*: Your quiz/homework average will constitute 30% of your final grade. Most quizzes and homework will be drawn from the exercises in the book. You should plan to do them all.

*Exams*: There will be a take-home midterm and an in-class final (Wednesday, May 7 2:00-4:30). Each exam will count for 30% of your final grade.

*Attendance and Participation*: A&P will count for the remaining 10% of your final grade.

**Late Work:** All late work will be docked a full letter grade for every day that it is late.
