Special Studies- Landscape Photography

Course Description-

This Special Studies section will concentrate in the methods, concepts, and various aesthetic strategies of Landscape photography. Instruction will focus on the historical and contemporary approaches to picturing the land- from 19th century survey explorations of the unsettled West, to the formalist beauty of the mid-20th, to contemporary artists addressing the troubled relationship between nature and human civilization. Classwork will include work in the field as well as lecture and lab.

Prerequisite- ART 3360 or permission of the instructor

Student Learning Outcomes- Students will be able to:

- Demonstrate proficiency and creative control of the technical and aesthetic concerns specific to landscape photography
- Identify and articulate the conceptual underpinnings of the concept of "landscape" in general, and landscape photography in particular.
- Identify and articulate the influence of those conceptual underpinnings on their own work, as well as by other photographers
- Identify major historical and contemporary artists and theorists, and their contribution to the dialogue about the nature of "landscape" and landscape photography.

Recommended Textbooks-

There is no specific textbook but there will be a series of required readings, which will be discussed in class. All required readings will be posted as .pdf files to the class Blackboard section.

Attendance and Grading-

You are required to attend all lectures and critiques and to turn in work when it is due. If you miss a lecture or demonstration, you are responsible for gathering material you have missed. If you know you are going to miss a required class due to travel or other planned events, inform the instructor ahead of time. If there is an emergency preventing you from coming to a required class, contact me as soon as is practical.

All work is due at the beginning of class time on the due date. Late assignments will not be accepted without prior communication and arrangement.

*All students who are Majors in Photography must complete either one of the short themed assignments, or the Final Project, using 4x5 analog film cameras, though they need not be printed on analog (silver gelatin) prints.

All assignments, as well as all readings, will be discussed in class and posted to Blackboard. It is the student's responsibility to be familiar with the criteria and due dates of each assignment.

Assignments are given one letter grade based on three criteria- Technical skill, aesthetic sensibility, and conceptual rigor.

- **A** Indicates outstanding work, which goes far beyond simply completing the assignment. A superior level of innovation, thoroughness, effort, and thought.
- **B** Indicates better-than-average work, which does go beyond the basic requirements of the assignment, but may still have significant problems.
- **C** Indicates average work. Basic satisfaction of all the requirements, but may lack innovation, effort, or thoughtfulness.
- **D** Indicates less than average work. Does not meet the basic requirements. Sloppy, last-minute efforts given inadequate time or consideration.
- **F** Indicates incomplete or grossly negligent work.
