Time and Place of Class Meetings:

This class meets online in Blackboard. While most class participation is asynchronous, some synchronous online activities may be scheduled.

Description of Course Content:

Clinical management of the high-risk neonate using evidence based knowledge, research, pharmacological, and technological therapies. Includes clinical management of complex health problems affecting infants (birth to 2 years of age) and their families including chronic care and ethical issues.

Other Requirements:

Prerequisite: NURS 5537. As this course is offered in an online format, each student must have access to a computer and a high speed internet connection on a daily basis. - 1. Assess, diagnose, and plan for the management of health care needs of the high-risk neonate using evidence-based knowledge.
- 2. Use pharmacologic and technologic therapies in the management of the high risk neonate's complex acute and chronic illnesses.
- 3. Develop plans for health promotion and disease prevention in the care of the high-risk neonate within their family system.

The SafeAssign DRAFT is not reviewed by your instructor. When you upload, please check the "submit as draft" option. The DRAFT box becomes available 72 hours prior to the final submission due date/ time and remains open until the date and time that the paper is due. At busy times, it may take up to 72 hours to receive a report.
- 2. FINAL: This Safe Assign location is separate and is the only one that will be graded. Only one document can be uploaded per SafeAssign. The document you upload to the FINAL dropbox is the one that will be graded, so be certain it is the correct paper.

<u>Expectations of Out-of-Class Study</u>: Beyond the time required to participate in class each week, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 12 hours per week on their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.

If the author's ideas are rephrased, by transposing words or expressing the same idea using different words, the idea must be attributed to the author by proper referencing giving the author's name and date of publication. If a single author's ideas are discussed in more than one paragraph, the author must be referenced, according to APA format. Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end of the paper.
