- 2. Examine social (ethnic/racial/cultural) and economic disparity as determinants of health among individuals and sub-populations.

- 4. Analyze major issues in international health and the effect on global sub-populations in relation to movement of population groups.
- 5. Analyze health issues related to adaptation of populations to migration and settlement.

Requirements:

To successfully complete this course, students must complete each of the following requirements. Criteria for each are posted on Black Board.

- 1. Organize and present a seminar topic
- 2. Maintain and submit a weekly journal as directed
- 3. Participate in course discussion both in class and on-line via Black Board
- 4. Write a paper related to a selected population

Teaching Methods/Strategies:

- Seminar and web-based discussion
- Selected readings
- Individual and group learning activities
- Simulated problem solving
- Epistemological reflection and writing

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations with due dates:

Paper: Social/Cultural Factors Affecting Health of a Sub Population

The objective of this paper is to assist you in becoming an expert on a specific health problem affecting a sub population group by increasing your understanding of the issues and research specific to that problem and group. The paper will be divided in three components to help you develop the final paper. These will be discussed in detail on first day of class. A detailed guideline for the Initial Paper, Final Paper Draft and Final Paper Revised are is posted on Black Board with the due dates. Papers are submitted to the instructor electronically no later than the posted due dates per schedule. Students will prepare a bibliography based on assigned readings to support their literature review as they develop the Paper submissions in the course.

Journals: Submit a weekly journal of *epistemological reflections*. Think of your journal as your professional diary. Keep a record of your activities, your thoughts about these activities (usefulness now and in the future in meeting your goals), and what additional activities you plan to pursue. The instructor will comment on your reflections, suggest additional or other activities, and make observations about your development as a scientist. A guideline describing the required components for each journal is posted on Black Board. Journals are submitted to the instructor electronically no later than the posted due dates per schedule.

Discussion Board and Class Participation: You are expected to substantively participate in course discussions during the scheduled class dates and via Discussion Board. It is expected that students will:

Actively share thoughts and ideas,

- Integrate course materials into discussions,
- Share pertinent personal/professional experiences,
- Pose questions/issues that provoke critical thought and analysis,
- Post substantive comments related to the weekly content and read, listen, and respond to the contributions of others.

Student led seminar: Each student will sign up to lead a Seminar. Based on the enrollment in the course, two but no more than three students will lead one a seminar on one of the course topics. Students will sign up for their date and topic during the first meeting of the course. Guidelines for student led seminars are posted on Black Board.

Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end
