PROGRAMA GENERAL DEL CURSO

Texto: *Introducción a la lingüística española, 3a. ed.* (2009), Milton M. Azevedo, Englewood Cliffs: Prentice Hall.

Objetivos: Este curso es un curso introductorio a la lingüística española que no presupone que el estudiante tenga previos conocimientos de la lingüística. Tras una introducción general a la lengua y el lenguaje, el estudiante va a adquirir el conocimiento de las distintas áreas de la lingüística—fonética y fonología (sonidos y sus relaciones), morfología (componentes de la palabra), sintaxis (componentes de la frase y oración) y semántica (significados de las palabras y frases)—para concluir con la variación y el cambio lingüísticos tanto diacrónicos (de latín al español contemporáneo) como sincrónicos (de dialectos regionales).

Asistencia: La asistencia a clase es obligatoria y todas las clases cuentan (OJO: es la regla de mi curso, no de la universidad). Se espera que el/la estudiante esté presente durante toda la clase cada día. Es la responsabilidad del/de la estudiante asistir a clase y estar al día en cuanto a las ausencias, las tareas y los temas discutidos en clase. Si el/la estudiante se ausenta más de TRES (3) días, será penalizado/a: **se deducirán TRES (3) puntos de la nota final por cada día de ausencia** a partir de la tercera ausencia. Además, si no está presente en clase, no recibirá puntos de

participación. En casos de emergencia, favor de hablar con la profesora. Ausencias debidas a la participación obligatoria en actividades de la universidad contarán como ausencias justificadas, siempre y cuando la profesora haya sido avisada de antemano (con debidos documentos).

El constante llegar tarde a clase resultará en una mala nota de asistencia y participación.

Participación:

Es la responsabilidad del estudiante el venir preparado para la clase. Para ello hay que consultar el plan de clases diariamente. La participación activa se considera un elemento fundamental de este curso (constituye 10% de la nota final!!). Se espera que la clase sea una discusión continua de TODA la clase (o de todos los estudiantes) sobre la lectura y los temas asignados para cada día.

Exámenes y pruebas:

Durante el semestre se realizarán **TRES (3)** exámenes en los cuales se evaluará el conocimiento de las lecciones y los temas discutidos en clase. Además, habrá varias pruebas durante el curso (aproximadamente 10-13) sobre lo discutido en clase y la lectura asignada para cada día. Generalmente se darán las pruebas al principio de las clases; si llega tarde, favor de quedarse en el pasillo hasta que el resto de la clase termine de tomar la prueba. **OJO: No se harán pruebas de recuperación (make-ups), ni se darán exámenes fuera de la fecha señalada, a menos que sean casos de emergencia.**

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 9 hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc. (A general rule is that for every credit hour earned, a student should spend 3 hours per week working outside of class. Therefore, since our class is a 3-hr. course, at least 9 hours per week are expected to be invested outside of class.)

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session.
