<u>Time and Place of Class Meetings</u>: This course meets on-line using Blackboard or other media as described in this syllabus. This is a 10 week course.

Description of Course Content:

This course focuses on developing an advanced knowledge base of pathophysiology across the lifespan. Principles of biochemistry, molecular biology and nutrition are applied to disease processes.

Other Requirements:

Students must have an up-to-date computer system with wired (not wireless) high speed internet in addition to e-mail and internet skills. The entire course will be delivered in an online format. Tests and quizzes will be given using Respondus Lockdown Browser with webcam monitoring. You will be required to download Respondus to complete any quiz or test. Respondus can be downloaded at: http://www.respondus.com/lockdown/installw2own.pl?ID=163943837

You will need a high definition (1080p) webcam. An external webcam is required to allow you to meet the requirements of the video monitoring for each quiz and test. An external webcam is one which is NOT built into your computer or laptop.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Apply knowledge of normal physiology and pathologic alterations across the lifespan that are expressed as diseases of organs and systems.
- 2. Use knowledge of environmental factors that influence genetically linked diseases.
- 3. Examine life-style measures associated with the prevention, restoration, and/or modification of disease processes.
- 4. Synthesize current research findings with evidenced-based guidelines for the management of selected diseases.

Recommended Text Book:

Costanzo, L. S. (2014) *Physiology*. Elsevier Saunders: Philadelphia, PA. 5th edition.

This textbook is recommended. You may find this book helpful in conjunction with the required text book while working through the case studies and the discussion board questions. There is not one text book that will contain all the answers. You will need to access additional resources to answer the discussion board questions and complete the case studies.

Course Format and Design

This course is presented completely online and is administered at an accelerated pace. The course builds upon your undergraduate education and will cover a significant amount of content over a short period of time. It is designed to facilitate and guide your learning. As such minimal written lecture content is provided. You will be required to read the text books and synthesize the information to complete all of the course assignments.

As a graduate student the expectations of this course and curriculum are different than your undergraduate education. You are expected to synthesize the information from your readings and be able to apply it to clinical scenarios in a manner which is reflective of advanced practice nursing. As a graduate student you are considered to be an independent learner and if needed identify additional resources to help you understand the concepts in the course.

Supplemental videos have been provided over select concepts for your review. These videos are not mandatory to view but you may find them helpful in understanding some of the content. For testing purposes you are responsible for the content in the text books and the written lectures which I have provided.

This format will require you to spend an average of 15-20 hours per week to complete all of the required readings and assignments. The majority of the concepts presented in the course are not new but the time you spend weekly will vary depending on your recall from previous undergraduate classes. Test blue prints for major tests (**NOT** the quizzes) have been provided which you can use to guide your studying and reading. **Working full time for most students is necessary. A full time work schedule has the potential of limiting one's ability to put forth the time required of this course or any course in the FNP program to be successful and may result in suboptimal grades.**

Course Assignment: Due Dates, Submissions, and Late Penalties

Only assignments submitted through blackboard will be reviewed and accepted for a grade, regardless of the reason. Assignments that are submitted through email will not be reviewed for feedback or graded and will be assigned a grade of zero. No exceptions will be made. Because technology is vulnerable to experiencing difficulties you should not wait till the last minute to submit an assignment, complete a quiz, or test. If you experience technical difficulties contact Blackboard Support to help resolve the issue. They are open 24 hours a day. Late assignments will not be accepted for a grade or reviewed for feedback (regardless of the reason) and will be assigned a zero. Quizzes and tests must be started, completed, and submitted prior to the submission due date and time. Any quiz or test submitted after the due date and time is subject to a point deduction up to and including a zero.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations with due dates:

Quizzes

There will be a quiz every week, except on the weeks that a test is scheduled. The quiz will cover the content found in the structure and function chapter or chapters assigned for the week. This will include the structure and function content found at the beginning of each chapter which covers the pediatric content for the week. It is extremely important to have an understanding of this content to understand and apply the concepts of pathophysiology. The quizzes are designed to help you solidify your knowledge of basic anatomy and physiology.

The quiz will open on Monday at 8:00am (CST) and close on Saturday at 8:00am (CST). You will be allowed to take the quiz 1 time only during this time period. There are no makeup quizzes. If you fail to take the quiz while it is open you will be assigned a zero. You are expected to do your own work. The use of reference materials or outside help of any kind is prohibited and doing so will result in an automatic zero. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped prior to calculating your course grade. All quizzes will be video monitored. You will need a high definition (1080p) webcam and it must be turned on in order to take any quiz. No exceptions will be made.

Discussion Board

Every week there will be a discussion board question that you will be required to answer. Your postings must be well thought out and supported using research, outcome data, concepts of physiology and/or pathophysiology. References should be provided in APA format at the end of each of your posts. This includes your original post and your response to your colleague's post.

Your response to the question (original post) is due on each Wednesday by 11:59pm (CST). You are required to review the posts and engage in a discussion as it relates to your original post and to one other classmate's original post. Your response to your classmate's original post is due every Friday by 11:59pm (CST).

The posts should be related to course content and science based. This is not a forum for religious or political discussions. Such postings will be removed from the discussion thread and will be assigned a zero.

Plagiarism is prohibited. Any assignment determined to have been plagiarized will be given a zero and the student reported for academic dishonesty. Copying your answers from your text books, journal articles, any website or any source is considered plagiarism. All of your work is to be in your own words, paraphrased, and referenced accordingly. Using quoted sentences is not an acceptable manner in which to complete any assignment in this course and does not

reflect synthesis of the material. Consequently the use of quoted sentences will result in a point deduction up to and including a zero.

Case Study

The case studies are designed to help you analyze a clinical scenario, interpret the pathophysiologic findings, and identify additional evaluation/tests needed. A clinical scenario will be presented each week and you will be asked to interpret the data, explain the pathologic process and related concepts. The answers to the case studies are to be submitted in blackboard every week by Sunday at 11:59pm (CST). Provide a list of references at the end of each of your answers, in APA format, prior to submitting your work. This is considered a professional writing assignment and you will be graded on grammar and spelling. You are expected to synthesize your readings and answer the questions. Plagiarism is prohibited. Any assignment determined to have been plagiarized will be given a zero and the student reported for academic dishonesty. Copying your answers from your text books, journal articles, any website or any source is considered plagiarism. All of your work is to be in your own words, paraphrased and referenced accordingly. Using quoted sentences is not an acceptable manner in which to complete any assignment in this course and does not reflect synthesis of the material. Consequently the use of quoted sentences will result in a point deduction up to and including a zero.

You will receive feedback for each case study submitted through blackboard. Case studies submitted after the due date will not be accepted for a grade or reviewed and will be assigned a grade of zero. The lowest case study grade will be dropped prior to calculating your course grade.

Tests

Each test will cover the pathologic concepts of disease. Concepts as they relate to the normal structure and function of each body system will be integrated into the test questions and you will need to be familiar with this content for testing purposes. Test questions may include direct content from the structure and function portion of the required readings. There will be a total of 50 questions on test 1 and test 2. The test questions will be multiple choice. You will have 87.5 minutes to complete test 1 and 2. Test 3 will have a total of 100 questions and you will be given a 175 minutes to complete test 3.

Test 3 is not comprehensive however the concepts in this course build on one another and will be integrated into each test. You will need to understand concepts from each week as they may appear in a test later in the course. You are expected to do your own work. The use of reference materials or outside help of any kind is prohibited and doing so will result in an automatic zero.

The test will be available to take beginning on Monday at 8:00am (CST) through Saturday at 8:00am (CST). You are expected to take the test at the scheduled time and will need to arrange your work and personal schedules around the test time. Otherwise a grade of zero will be assigned. All tests will be video monitored. You will need a high definition (1080p) webcam and it must be turned on in order to take any test. No exceptions will be made.

Quiz and Test Taking Rules

- Read the test taking tips prior to each quiz and test. Follow these tips to optimize your computer's functionality, enhance blackboard's function, and to minimize technical difficulties.
- Respondus Lockdown Browser with video monitoring will be used to administer each quiz and test. Please make sure to download Respondus prior to taking your first quiz.
- Update Respondus prior to completing each quiz and test.
- Update Java prior to completing each quiz and test.
- You will need an external high definition (1080p) webcam. This will ensure that your IDs and videos are clearly seen. You will use this webcam throughout the online FNP curriculum. An external webcam is one that is **not** built into your computer or laptop.
- To ensure your webcam is working properly, complete the webcam test prior to taking every quiz and test.
- If you are kicked out of a quiz or test, close your browser completely, reopen it, and log back into Respondus lockdown browser to continue taking the quiz or test.
- A photo ID is required to take the test. Show your driver's license or Mav ID when prompted by the system. Only your driver's license or Mav ID are acceptable forms of identification. A work ID badge, passport or other forms of ID are not acceptable and should not be used.
- Your photo ID must be held close enough to the camera to be read. The photo must be facing the camera.
- You will be asked to show your environment. When you are prompted please rotate the camera to show your desk in its entirety and show the entire room.
- Your face must be clearly visible during the entire time you are taking a quiz or test. Please ensure that there are no lights shining onto your computer from behind you. This will obscure the view of your face and ID.
- Your desk must be completely clear of all materials. Papers, pencils, pens, books, electronics, cell phones, tablets etc. are not allowed on or around your desk while taking a quiz or test.
- Drinks are not allowed while taking a quiz or test.
- No one else may be in the room while you are taking a quiz or test.
- Once you have started a quiz or test you are not allowed to leave your desk. You must complete and submit the quiz or test prior to leaving your desk.
- Plug in laptops and computers prior to starting the quiz or test.
- Talking is prohibited.
- The use of any electronics is strictly prohibited.
- Hats may not be worn while taking a quiz or test.

Any violation in the above rules may result in any and all of the following:

- A point deduction up to and including a grade of zero on the respective quiz or test.

- Reference list

Once you have completed the electronic poster on the power point template you will need to save it as a PDF. Please submit the PDF via blackboard for grading **AND** post it in the discussion board for week 10 by Wednesday at 11:59pm (CST). **Late submissions will not be accepted and will be assigned a grade of zero.**

Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end of the paper.
