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PROGRAMA GENERAL DEL CURSO

Texto:

Rojas, Jorge Nelson y Richard A. Curry (2003) *Gramática esencial*, 2a. ed., Boston: Houghton Mifflin.

Descripción del curso:

El curso está diseñado para estudiantes que ya han adquirido una proficiencia básica de la lengua española en los primeros dos años universitarios. Se extiende su conocimiento lingüístico con énfasis en la revisión de las estructuras gramaticales de español. Asimismo se enfatizan las destrezas de leer, escribir y hablar eficazmente en español.

Requisito para Español 3314: Español 2314 o su equivalente con una calificación de una C o superior.

Objetivos del curso:

El curso tiene como objetivo la comprensión de los principales usos gramaticales de la lengua española. El estudiante podrá identificar los tiempos y modos verbales principales, otras partes gramaticales (e.g. sustantivos, pronombres, determinantes (artículos definidos, posesivos, etc.), modificadores (adjetivos, adverbios), preposiciones, etc.) y los varios tipos de oración. Además de la gramática se incide en la ampliación del léxico, considerando un aspecto fundamental del dominio del español, haciendo hincapié en los aspectos problemáticos de ciertas palabras y expresiones. Se intentará desarrollar las destrezas oral, escrita y de comprensión auditiva y lectura, siempre con el propósito de aplicar y utilizar las estructuras gramaticales y ampliar el conocimiento léxico con los vocabularios aprendidos en el presente curso.

Asistencia:

La asistencia a clase es obligatoria, ya que el estudiante que no asiste a clase no puede participar (OJO: Es la regla de mi curso, no de la universidad). Es la responsabilidad del estudiante asistir a clase y estar al día en cuanto a las ausencias, las tareas y los temas discutidos en clase. Si el estudiante falta más de TRES (3) días, será penalizado: **se deducirán TRES (3) puntos de la nota final por cada ausencia** a partir de la tercera ausencia. Además, si no está presente en clase, no recibirá puntos de participación.

Ausencias debidas a la participación obligatoria en actividades de la universidad contarán como ausencias justificadas, siempre y cuando la profesora haya sido avisada de antemano (con debidos documentos oficiales).

El constante llegar tarde a clase resultará en una mala nota de asistencia y participación.

Participación (10%):

Es la responsabilidad del estudiante el venir preparado para la clase. Para ello hay que consultar el plan de clases diariamente. La participación activa se considera un elemento fundamental de este curso.

Se espera que el/la estudiante llegue a cada clase preparado/a a participar ya que la clase será una discusión continua de todos los presentes en clase y no presentaciones o lecciones individuales de la profesora.

Pruebas (10%):

Habrá varias pruebas durante el semestre sobre los temas discutidos en clase. Generalmente se darán las pruebas al principio de las clases; si llega tarde, favor de quedarse en el pasillo hasta que termine de tomar la prueba el resto de la clase. OJO: NO se harán pruebas de recuperación (*NO make-ups*).

Ensayos (20%):

El/la estudiante escribirá varios ensayos. Se darán más detalles durante el semestre. No se aceptará ningún ensayo entregado tarde.

Exámenes (50%):

Durante el semestre se realizarán CUATRO (4) exámenes en los cuales se evaluará el conocimiento de los temas discutidos durante el semestre. No se darán exámenes fuera de la fecha señalada, a menos que sean casos de emergencia.

OJO: Las fechas de entrega de los trabajos escritos y de exámenes pueden variar y los componentes se pueden modificar levemente a lo largo del semestre, dependiendo de varios factores. Cualquier cambio se anunciará con suficiente antelación.

Informaciones pertinentes al curso:

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 9 hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc. (A general rule is that for every credit hour earned, a student should spend 3 hours per week working outside of class. Therefore, since our class is a 3-hr. course, at least 9 hours per week are expected to be invested outside of class.)

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance.** Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing.
