Time and Place of Class Meetings: Tuesday and Thursday 5:00pm-6:20pm, FA 309

Description of Course Content: Physical, mechanical, electrical, optical, magnetic, thermal and chemical properties of metals, semiconductors, ceramics, polymers, composites, and aggregates and the relationships between these properties and the electronic, crystal, micro and macro-structures of the materials. Prerequisites: CHEM 1442 or CHEM 1465; PHYS 1444.

Required Textbooks and Other Course Materials: *Materials Science and Engineering: An Introduction* by William D. Callister, Jr and David G. Rethwisch, 9th Edition

Descriptions of Major Assignments and Examinations: Weekly (or biweekly) homework assignments, two 80 minute in-class exams, and final exam. No late homework will be accepted unless prior arrangements are made with the instructor for valid excuses. There will be no makeup exams: If you have a valid reason for missing an exam, I will work with you to reach an acceptable time to take the exam. Cases will be dealt with on a case-by-case process.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required. Rather, each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I will factor attendance into the grade (15%) as follows: A (full credit) 0-1, B 2-3, C 4-5, D 6-7, F (no credit) > 7 unexcused absences. If you have a real excuse, you must notify me via email (preferably in advance).

Grading: Homework 15%, Exam 1 20%, Exam 2 20%, Final (Comprehensive) 30%, Attendance 15%

Make-up Exams: Make-up exams will not be provided unless special circumstances warrant.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance**. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Final Review Week: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.
