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PROGRAMA GENERAL DEL CURSO

Descripción del curso:

El curso está diseñado para estudiantes que ya han adquirido una proficiencia básica de la lengua española en los primeros dos años universitarios. Se extienden el conocimiento y las destrezas lingüísticas de la lengua española, con énfasis en la revisión de las estructuras gramaticales de español.

Requisito para Español 3314: Español 2314 o su equivalente con una calificación de una C o superior.

Objetivos del curso:

El curso tiene como objetivo la comprensión de los principales usos gramaticales de la lengua española. Se espera que el estudiante logre lo siguiente:

- usar adecuadamente las estructuras gramaticales, como los tiempos y modos verbales y conjugaciones, preposiciones, pronombres, artículos, participios, etc.
- identificar las partes y componentes de la oración: sustantivo, verbo, adjetivo, adverbio, y los tipos de oración;
- adquirir las reglas de acentuación y ortografía;
- reconocer las similitudes y los contrastes entre los términos de inglés y español para poder evitar los cognados falsos y otras interferencias lingüísticas de inglés;
- desarrollar las destrezas lingüísticas—el hablar, la comprensión auditiva, habilidad de leer y escribir;
- desarrollar las habilidades de pensar críticamente: creatividad, análisis y evaluación de lengua hablada y escrita;
- demostrar la consciencia de comportamiento sociocultural y patrón de comunicación de los hablantes nativos y no nativos.

Asistencia:

La asistencia a clase es sumamente importante en este curso, ya que el estudiante que no asiste a clase no puede participar (Ésta es la regla de mi curso, no de la universidad). La participación activa se considera un elemento fundamental de este curso. El/La estudiante que no está presente no recibirá puntos de participación.

Se espera que el/la estudiante llegue a cada clase preparado/a a participar ya que la clase será una discusión continua de todos los presentes en clase y no presentaciones o lecciones individuales de la profesora.

Tarea (20%):

Se entregan las tareas de los ejercicios gramaticales (véase el programa) diariamente al principio de cada clase. Al entrar a la clase, favor de dejar la tarea asignada para ese día en el escritorio de la profesora. **No se aceptará ninguna tarea después de la fecha indicada.**

Pruebas (20%):

Habr  varias pruebas durante el semestre sobre los temas discutidos en clase. Generalmente se dar n las pruebas al principio de las clases; si llega tarde, favor de quedarse en el pasillo hasta que termine de tomar la prueba el resto de la clase. OJO: NO se har n pruebas de recuperaci n (*NO make-up quizzes!*).

Ex menes (50%):

Other information and University regulations:

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required. Rather, each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this course, I have established the attendance policy described above (see "Attendance" on Pg. 2). Again remember, I take attendance on a daily basis and students are assigned a daily participation grade.

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 9 hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc. (A general rule is that for every credit hour earned, a student should spend 3 hours per week working outside of class. Therefore, since our class is a 3-hr. course, at least 9 hours per week are expected to be invested outside of class.)

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance.** Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing.
