Description: Mathematical analysis with emphasis on solution techniques and engineering applications. Topics include: ordinary differential equations (ODE), Laplace Transform, numerical solutions of ODE, boundary value problems, Fourier series, Sturm-Liouville problem and vector calculus.

Student Learning Outcomes: This course is intended to provide students with: i) a basic understanding of differential equations and their application to fundamental engineering problems, ii) develop a diverse knowledge of mathematical methods and know how to apply them, and iii) the ability to solve mathematical models for engineering problems.

Prerequisites: C or better in MATH 2326 and MAE 2360 (or concurrent enrollment).

Attendance/Grading:

1. Class attendance is not required but strongly encouraged. I will not take attendance but periodic quizzes will be given in class, which may affect your overall grade.
2. Homework will be posted on the course website and is due at the beginning of lecture in class or via Blackboard. Late homework will be penalized 10% per day that it is late (max 3 days – after that it will not be accepted). Include your name, 1000#, and staple all pages.
3. All quizzes/exams will be closed book, closed notes. Final exam will be comprehensive.
4. Any makeup quiz/exam will be given only under extenuating circumstances. Please notify me at least one week in advance via email if you anticipate an excused absence.
5. Students will have the option of dropping their lowest exam grade or quiz avg. – must take all 3 exams to be eligible. Otherwise, if an exam is missed with an unexcused absence, a zero will be factored into an average with the quiz avg. for 20% of the overall grade.

6. This course requires that students submit designated assignment(s) in order to assess specific course objectives – referred to as “key assignments”. One of the homework assignments will be designated as a key assignment. All students must submit the key assignment.

Final Review Week: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations.
