## Course Objectives:

- Students can provide clear understanding of University policies pertaining to academic standing and degree requirements.
- Students will develop decision-making skills and the ability to plan for self-determined goals.
- Instructor will guide student through various self-assessment tools. Student will be able to identify interests, skills, values and personality. Student will evaluate the impact these factors have on their career and educational goals with results from MyPlan.com
- Instructor will discuss the process of major exploration; students will become familiar with the majors, minors and certificates offered at UT Arlington.
- Instructor will facilitate student decision-making and provide campus resources.
- Instructor will empower and encourage students to become a self-advocate.

## Course Requirements:

**Attendance Policy:** Attendance is required and will be checked at the beginning of each class. Students not in class on time will be counted as absent. **More than three absences, excused or unexcused, will result in a grade of "F" for the course.**

**Classroom Participation Policy:** Each student is expected to keep up with course assignments, readings, and to attend class. An attitude of cooperation, a willingness to contribute ideas and experiences, and openness to new concepts and theories will enhance your collegiate experience.

College level behavior, courteousness, and active participation are expected from each student. **Turn off all cell phones, computers, pagers, iPods, and other electronic equipment.** Students that neglect to turn off their phones or are found using their cell phones to send text messages will be asked to leave class for the remainder of the class period and will be assessed absence deductions accordingly.

## Assignments

- All assignments are graded on a Pass/Fail basis.
- Any papers assigned for homework must be **typed, 12 font and double spaced.**
- Consult instructor for more information on any missed assignments.
- **Not completing 3 or more assignments will result in an "F" for the class.**
- **Not completing the MyPlan assignment will result in an "F" for the class.**

**Drop Policy:** Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-**
