Conversación avanzada / Advanced Spanish Conversation : SPAN 3303

DESCRIPCIÓN

Practice in oral expression with an emphasis on vocabulary building and grammar review. Of special interest to students who wish to improve their skills in pronunciation, comprehension, and oral expression. Credit will not be granted to native or heritage speakers of Spanish. Prerequisite: SPAN 2314 with a grade of C or better.

OBJECTIVES:

- —to develop and improve students' ability to express their opinions and to communicate in Spanish
- —to learn new vocabulary
- —to improve grammar in Spanish
- —to practice strategies for maintaining a conversation
- —to improve fluency through the discussion of current events

Attendance: Attendance in this class is obligatory, given that the student who does not attend is unable to participate in classroom discussion. The student will receive a ZERO for participation on the day that he/she is absent. If the student is absent more than 3 class meetings, he/she will be penalized 2% of the final grade for each subsequent absence. Given that late arrivals disrupt class, every 3 tardies will equal an absence.

Preparation outside of class: It is expected that the student will arrive at class prepared to participate with all pertinent reading assignments/homework completed. According to the university accreditation agencies, a Carnegie unit is used to measure the reasonable amount of time a student can be expected to spend each week outside of class. For each hour of credit that a student receives for a course, it is reasonable that the student may spend up to 3 hours outside of class per week preparing for the class. Thus, for a 3-hour credit course, student may spend up to 9 hours a week preparing for the class.

Class routine:

Topic discussion days:

- 1. Before arriving at class- Each student is expected to read the chapter that discusses the topic, complete the notes for the chapter (see file in BB), and study the vocabulary at the end of the chapter. In addition, the student will bring an article in Spanish from a Spanish newspaper (see Blackboard for links to online newspapers) that deals with the topic of the day. There is an Article form in Blackboard that the student will complete and turn in.
- 2. Vocabulary quiz at the beginning of class (the words are found at the end of the chapter)
- 3. Students will form groups of 3 or 4 and discuss the assigned topic. In each group 1 person will be the director to guide the discussion of the group. Another person will be the secretary and take notes about what the group says in order to present these ideas to the class in the next class meeting. Each student will be the secretary at least twice, once before mid-term and once after mid-term. The secretary will also evaluate the participation and contributions of the members of the group. **The instructor may modify this participation grade if she deems necessary**

Grammar review/Oral presentation Days:

- 1. Before class- the student will complete the grammar review exercise assigned and bring it to class completed. At the beginning of class the instructor will verify that these exercises are complete and assign a grade for these assignments.
- 2. The secretaries will present an oral summary to the class of the ideas from his/her group about the topic (see below-Presentation of the Secretaries).
- 3. The class will review the grammar exercise and then use the grammar point in interacting with fellow students.

Participation: (30%)

The participation grade consists of:

grades given by the secretaries on topic discussion days grades given by the instructor (grammar review days, movie discussion days, etc.)

The instructor will take the average of these grades at mid-term and at finals and enter the average in the gradebook.

Please limit leaving the classroom during class time to a minimum. If it becomes a habit, it may affect the student's participation grade for the day and/or (if it is pervasive enough) may count as a tardy/absent.

Presentation of the secretaries: (20%)

Each student will be the secretary on Topic Discussion days at least twice during the semester (once before mid-term and once after). The class meeting following the Topic Discussion day, the student will do an oral presentation of 5 minutes informing the class about what was discussed in the group. Oral presentation are individual assignments and should be prepared without help from translators, native/heritage speakers, etc, as these actions constitute plagiarism. IT IS NOT ACCEPTABLE TO READ THE PRESENTATION. Students may have one 3 x 5 index card with an outline on it while presenting, but may not have any complete sentences written on it. After the presentation, the student will hand in the index card to the instructor. Presentation and eye contact are important.

Opportunities to make-up missed presentations will not be given, unless the instructor determines that there was an extreme situation that caused the student to be absent that can be properly documented. If such a situation is allowed, the student will receive a maximum of 80% for the presentation grade. It is the student's responsibility to choose when he/she will be the secretary.

Oral interviews: (20%)

At mid-term and at finals there will be two oral interviews scheduled by appointment with the instructor. The interviews will count as the mid-term exam and the final exam grades. They will be based on the topics, grammar, and movies discussed in class.

Quizzes: (15%)

- 1. Vocabulary quizzes- For each topic, there will be a vocabulary quiz at the beginning of class on the Topic discussion days. The vocabulary for the quizzes is found at the end of the chapter for each topic. Students should seek to employ the new vocabulary during the group discussions. If a student arrives tardy, or is absent, he/she will not be given extra time / the opportunity to make-up the quiz.
- 2. Grammar quizzes- Twice during the semester there will be a grammar quiz dealing with the gramatical structures that are reviewed in class (see course calendar for dates).

Make- up quizzes will not be given, but the lowest quiz grade will be eliminated in the semester average.

Homework: (15%)

Homework consists of notes about the chapter readings, the article worksheet, and grammar exercises. The forms for these assignments are found in Blackboard in Course Materials. The summary of the interview with a native speaker will count under the category of Homework (see below).

Homework is due at the beginning of clase on the day assigned. Late work is not accepted. If a student must be absent, he/she may email the completed assignment to the instructor BY THE START OF CLASS ON THE DAY ASSIGNED in order to prove that he/she had completed it on time. In order to receive credit for the assignment, the student must then bring the completed assignment on paper to the instructor at the beginning of the next class meeting. If the student does not bring the assignment, he/she will receive a zero on the assignment. The instructor will not print out assignments for the student. The lowest 2 homework grades will be eliminated in the semester average.

Interview with a native Spanish speaker: Each student will interview a native speaker of Spanish in regard to a topic chosen the student's discussion group. After conducting the interview, the student will write a one-page summary of the interview to turn, and the student will turn in a recording of the interview to the instructor. In class the group will present what they learned about the ideas/attitudes of the interviewees regarding the chosen topic. If a student does not do the interview and/or does not bring a summary and recording of the interview, he/she will not be part of the presentation and will receive a zero for the presentation. See course calendar for presentation day.

To calculate the semester grade:

The following formula is used in calculating the semester average. Don't forget to drop the lowest quiz grade and the 2 lowest homework grades.

[3 (participación avg.) + 1.5 (tareas avg.) + 1.5 (pruebas avg.) + 2 (presentación oral avg) + 2 (entrevista oral avg)]

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UNIVERSITY POLICIES

University attendance policy: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Drop policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue until the last drop date of **4:00 pm CST**, **Wednesday**, **November 2**, **2016.** It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Undergraduate students who drop a course on or before the Last Drop Date will receive an automatic grade of "W" regardless of whether they have completed assignments or not.
