COURSE CATALOG

SOCI 1311 Introduction to Sociology. A scientific approach to the analysis and explanation of culture, personality, and social organization. The social processes and mechanisms of interaction in the natural process of cultural development, dissemination, assimilation, and the institutions of the groups. 3 credits, Fall and Spring.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

This course satisfies the University of Texas at Arlington core curriculum requirement in Social and Behavioral Sciences.

Objectives as mandated by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board include to Develop:

- *Critical Thinking Skills* including creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- *Communication Skills* including effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- Social Responsibility including intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.
- *Empirical and Quantitative Skills* including the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1) Apply sociological theoretical paradigms to the dynamics of society.
- 2) Define and describe social scientific research methods and designs.
- 3) Describe culture, subculture, counterculture, and global culture.
- 4) Explain what molds and moves society.
- 5) Describe the socialization processes.
- 6) Identify leadership styles, group dynamics, and how they affect members' behavior.
- 7) Define deviance and at least four major theories of deviance.
- 8) Define social stratification, dimensions of stratification and major social stratification theories.
- 9) Define Global Stratification and apply theories of global stratification.
- 10) Define aging, social theories of aging, and the negative and positive impact of aging.
- 11) Identify the major religions of the world and their consequences on social behavior.
- 12) Identify the functions of education and discuss the impact of education on social stratification.
- 13) State the major health risks in United States and discuss social inequality and healthcare.

ASSESSMENT AND PROCEDURES

EXAMS: Assessments include **four** exams. Each exam will be worth 100 points. Students must complete all exams to pass this course. The format for each exam will be discussed in advance. Examination dates are clearly listed in the course outline.

MAKE UP POLICY: All students are expected to take all 4 exams as scheduled. No early or late exams will be given UNLESS you have a legitimate written excuse such as a written documentation of death or a serious illness, court appearance, or absence on a college sponsored function. These are the only legitimate excuses for failure to show up for any examination. **Make sure you understand these policies.** Remember that it is your responsibility to contact me if you must miss an exam for any reason

ASSIGNMENT: At the end of the semester, all students must complete a **mandatory Signature Assignment** worth 20 points that will be administered and graded via BlackBoard. The assignment will address the four Core Objectives mandated by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board stated above. Completion of this assignment is important because it will affect your final grade.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance to all class meetings is required for success in this class, it will be recorded, and it may affect your final grade. If you come to class 20 minutes after the class is in session without a legitimate excuse, you may be marked absent for that day. It is your responsibility to contact me after class to sign you up for attendance if you are 20 or less minutes late for class. If you arrive within 20 minutes after class begins and you fail to notify me on that day, you will be marked absent.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Each student is encouraged to engage in class discussions pertaining to text/lecture materials, movies, and other topics relevant to the course. I value your input as well as your contributions, and I will do my best to encourage them by working with you to create a climate that is conducive for your participation. I am sure that all of you will have something to contribute at one time or another. Please do so. I will treat your contributions with respect, and I expect you to do the same for your classmates. Students that actively engage in class activities and discussion will earn extra credits.

READINGS

The readings for this class are not easy. It is extremely important that you have enough time to devote to your readings. Therefore, if you are not able to read the text and review your notes regularly you will not be successful in this class. It is vital to your success that you do your readings on a timely basis, attend all class sessions, engage in class discussions, take good notes, and ask questions if you fail to understand. Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 2 hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc. I will not remind you of missed assignments, notes, handouts, or any other matter. If you must miss a class meeting, it is your responsibility to find out what you missed from fellow students. If your score falls below 70% on any of the given assignments, don't hesitate to contact me about your performance for help. I will always be glad to see you.

FINAL REVIEW WEEK: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations is designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow you sufficient time to prepare for your finals. During this week, classes are held as scheduled.

DROP POLICY

Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period.
