DESCRIPTIONS OF MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMINATIONS: The course has been designed to promote active learning AND learning at multiple stages.

INDIVIDUAL QUIZZES (30%): All individual quizzes will be completed on Blackboard. You will have between 20-30 minutes to complete each quiz. All quizzes will be comprised of multiple choice and true/false questions. Once you start a quiz, **YOU MUST COMPLETE IT DURING THAT ATTEMPT.**

GROUP QUIZZES (20%): During the second week, you will be randomly assigned to a group. Once you are assigned to a group, you wll need to sit next to your group members. This is necessary for you to interact with your group members and to take the group quizzes.

You will need an IF-AT form to take the group quiz. I will provide you with these forms. You will have approximately 25 minutes to complete 10 questions with your team. Once you have completed your team quiz and calculated your team score, you will hand in the text questions and your IF-AT Form. If you are late to the group quiz, you may not take it.

MAKE-UP EXAMS: If you miss an exam because of a documented absence, you will be allowed to make up the exam. All make up exams must be completed within 5 days of the documented absence.

EXPECTATIONS FOR OUT-OF-CLASS STUDY: A general rule of thumb is this: for every credit hour earned, a student should spend 3 hours per week working outside of class. Hence, a 3-credit course might have a minimum expectation of 9 hours of reading, study, etc.

DROP POLICY: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. FINAL REVIEW WEEK: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week unless specified in the class syllabus.
