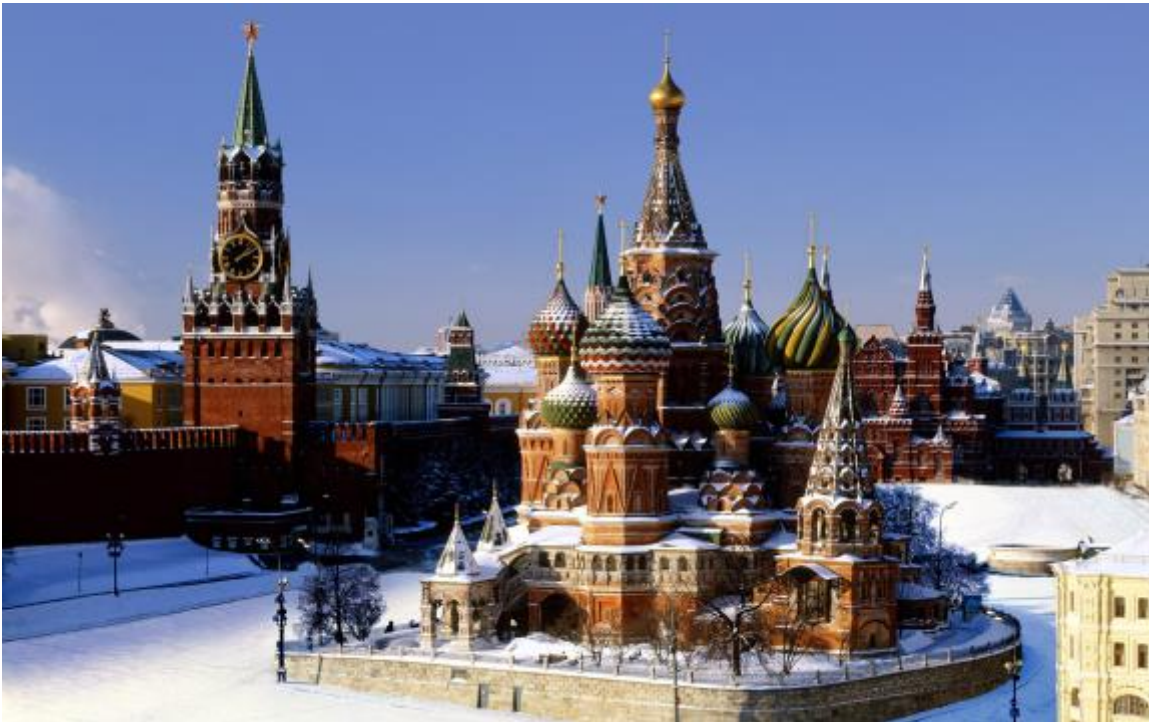

**Description of Course Content:** An introduction to the Russian language and culture course is intended for students with no previous knowledge of Russian. Using multimedia immersion in the culture and language of Russia and other Russian-speaking regions, the course is designed to enable students to understand and communicate effectively in Russian at a novice level. The course will consist of classroom activities, readings, quizzes, discussions, roleplay, and other active learning tasks. All five skills – reading, listening, grammar, writing, and speaking – are incorporated in the course. There are no prerequisites.

**Student Learning Outcomes:**

Students will gain basic knowledge of conversational Russian and of cultural contexts. By the end of the course, students should expect to:

- be able to read Russian Cyrillic Alphabet and practice basic writing, listening comprehension, and spoken/written Russian
- be able to read short texts from various sources (adapted and authentic), understand the main idea and supporting details;
- be able to write a short note, etc.;

- understand the main information (topic, purpose, place, and time, etc.), presented in dialogues and monologues;
- be able to carry on a dialogue in simple situations;
- use grammatical and lexical skills to present the statements of intentions in simple situations;
- have broad understanding of Russian culture through print, digital media, and oral conversations.

- You will be asked to have a smart device during class (such as a smart phone, laptop, or a tablet), so you can participate in classroom games.

**Attendance:** At the University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance.

As the instructor of this section, I have established the following attendance policy:

**Students are supposed to attend all the classes and participate in discussions. All classes and exams are based upon that assumption. You are responsible for acquiring class notes if you must miss. Ultimately, you will find that regular attendance is essential for a satisfactory grade performance. Absence and/or tardiness will affect your Course Engagement grade (see below).**

However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

**Descriptions of major assignments and examinations:**

**Course Engagement:** Course engagement refers to regular on-time attendance, preparation for class, participation in discussions, and physical as well as mental presence in the classroom. Course engagement grades cannot be made up.

**Quizzes:** There will be a number of unannounced quizzes to ensure that you are doing your assignments, and are staying on top of the vocabulary and grammatical concepts

introduced. You must come prepared to each class meeting having done the assignments and having learned the vocabulary due by that day. Most quizzes will be given at the beginning of class, so you want to make sure you are on time, so you don't miss the quiz. If you are absent or late on that day and did not participate in a quiz, you will receive a zero. These quizzes cannot be made up; however, *one* lowest grade will be dropped in both 1441 and 1442.

**Homework:** Aside from vocabulary lists, you will have homework assignments for each class. If you were absent or late and did not arrange to submit your homework when it was due, no late assignments will be graded; however, *one* homework lowest grade will be dropped both in 1441 and in 1442.

**Tests:** There will be a test at the end of each Unit (Lesson). The tests will include a combination of listening, vocabulary, grammar, reading, and writing based on the materials from that unit. Although graded, these tests are mainly for you and for the instructor to evaluate your progress and to see which part(s) you need to review. *One* lowest test grade will be dropped in 1441 only.

**Final Project/ Portfolio:** You will prepare and present an individual or a group project based on the topic of your choice (subject instructor's approval). The format can be a role-play in Russian (that can be played out or videotaped) or a portfolio presentation. If a student decides to create and present a portfolio, it must have at least 5 items, and must be related to Russian language and culture. Grading rubrics for the final project will be provided. This grade is part of 1442.

**Journal:** Every other week you will write a journal entry in one of the class journals. The themes of the journals are: Russian Music, Russian Movies/ Cartoons, Russian Cuisine, Russian Poetry, Russian Novel, About Me, and Free Topic. Each entry must be in Russian, in cursive, in full sentences, 3-10 sentences long, and should be about yourself or related to Russia/Russian culture. The suggested questions to be answered and example entry will be provided. Creativity and illustrations will be also evaluated. You will need to submit three journal entries in 1441 and two in 1442.

**Final Exam:** At the end of the semester, there will be a comprehensive final exam, which will include a listening test, a reading, short dialogue based on a situation (in pairs), a grammar test (oral and written), and a writing portion. This grade is part of 1442.

**IMPORTANT!** In this class, we will be following a "flipped classroom" model. This means that new vocabulary and grammar will not be introduced in class, but the necessary tools will be provided for the students to learn as much as possible BEFORE coming to class, where we will be actively working on the material together.

**Grading Policy:**

Your course grade will be determined as follows (A = 90% or above; B = 80-90%; C = 70-80%; D = 60-70%; F = below 60%):

Course Engagement: 20%

Quizzes: 10%

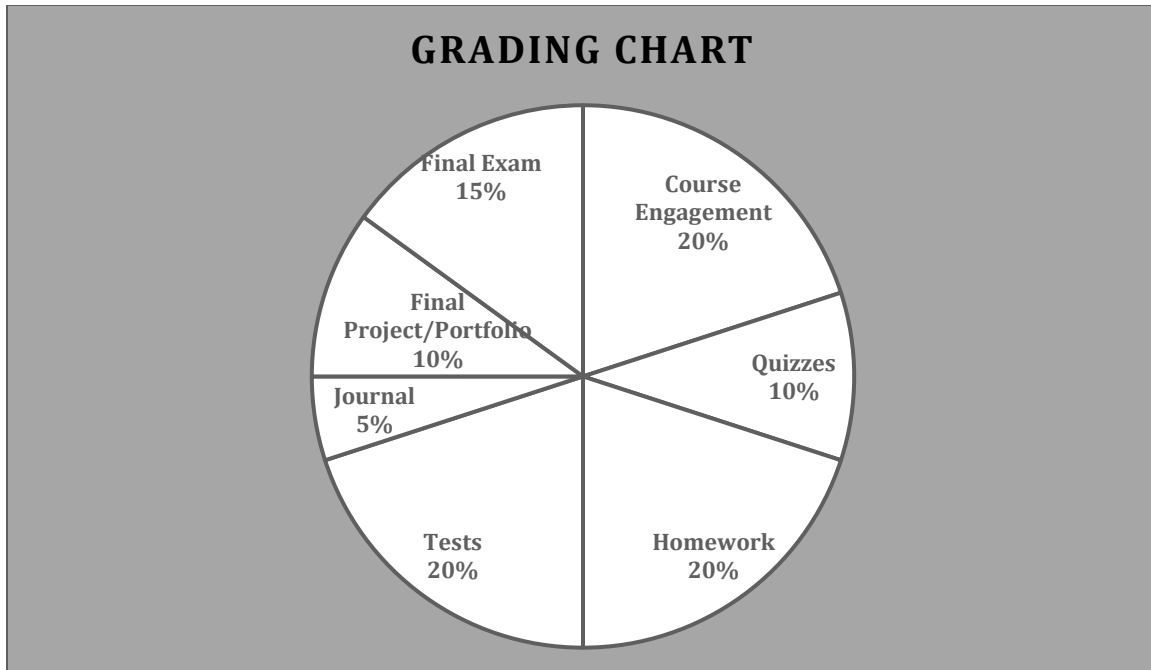
Homework: 20%

Tests: 20%

Final Project/Portfolio: 10%

Journals: 5%

Final Exam: 15%



**Final Grades:** *Since this is a combined section, you will receive two final grades at the end of the semester. The first final grade will be for RUSS 1441. It will be the current grade that you have after Test 4. After that point, the grades for the rest of the course including the final project and final exam will be counted towards RUSS 1442 grade. Thus, the second grade will exclude the activity included in the first grade. The Blackboard grade calculations are set up accordingly.*

**Grading:** Students are expected to keep track of their performance throughout the semester and seek guidance from available sources (including the instructor) if their performance drops below satisfactory levels. All grades and Course Grade (in progress) will be always available on Blackboard.

**Expectations for Out-of-Class Study:** Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this intensive course should expect to spend at least additional 15 hours per week of their own time in course-related activities, including listening to/reading required materials, completing small projects, assignments, preparing for classes and exams, completing on-line assignments, etc.

**Make-up Policy:** There will be NO make-up exams, homework, assignments, or quizzes. Extreme circumstances with valid proof provided may be considered by the instructor; however, there are no guarantees. If the late assignment is ever accepted, it can only receive maximum 50% of the earned grade. A grade of zero will be recorded for a missed test/assignment. Some low grades, however, will be dropped (see above).

**Extra Credit:**

**Russian Culture Society**

If you attend RCS meetings, you will get 10 points extra for each time you attend. To ensure receiving the points, you must sign in at each meeting on a designated sheet for our class. These points can be added to Quiz, HW, or Course Engagement grades.

**Grade Grievances:** Any appeal of a grade in this course must follow the procedures and deadlines for grade-related grievances as published in the current University Catalog.

**Drop Policy:** Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance.** Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. **Student Feedback Survey:** At the end of each term, students enrolled in face-to-face and online classes categorized as "lecture," "seminar," or "laboratory" are directed to complete an online Student Feedback Survey (SFS). Instructions on how to access the SFS for this course will be sent directly to each student through MavMail approximately 10 days before the end of the term. Each student's feedback via the SFS database is aggregated with that of other students enrolled in the course. Students' anonymity will be protected to the extent that the law allows. **Final Review Week:** For semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.

**Emergency Exit Procedures:** Should we experience an emergency event that requires us to vacate the building, students should exit the room and move toward the nearest exit, which is located down the hall. When exiting the building during an emergency, one should never take an elevator but should use the stairwells. Faculty members and instructional staff will assist students in selecting the safest route for evacuation and will make arrangements to assist individuals with disabilities.
