Course Goals: By the end of this course you will be able to do the following

- Define and differentiate between illness and disease
- Describe the main theoretical orientations and frameworks utilized in medical anthropology
- Understand how health and illness are constructed across various cultures
- Observe the impact of culture on health and illness
- Discuss how medical anthropology can be utilized in a wide range of fields including the health professions

Core Course Objectives:

- · Cross cultural understanding
- Critical analysis of health care systems
- Contextualize the meaning of disease and illness from a cultural perspective

Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to draw attention to the growing field of medical anthropology. Specifically, this course is designed to enrich the student's perspective on illness, health, and healing across cultures. By debunking the myth that western biomedicine encompasses the sole framework for understanding illness and healing one can begin to understand how culture also plays a contributing role in defining, accepting, understanding, and treating illness. Students will be introduced to key theoretical concepts in the field of medical anthropology and gain a broad perspective regarding the applicability of the field in the world around us especially in the area of public health. The course seeks to engage students in an interactive dialogue regarding experiences and understandings of the terms, culture, health, illness, disease, medicine and healing. Lectures, readings, class discussions, films, maps and handouts are used to explore these topics and to provide the foundation for the three exams.

Overview of major projects and assignments & grading policy

All assignments shall be typed in Times New Roman 12point font with 1 inch margins and double spaced. Grades will be calculated based on Quizzes, Article search, Group Project, Health Matter Analysis, Syllabus Assignment and 3 exams. Students should expect to spend approximately 9 hours outside of class time reading, studying and preparing assignments for class.

Group Project: During this course you will be required to participate in a group project where you will document a form of alternative or complimentary healing in video format. The video must be 10 minutes in length and will focus on the healing narrative or experience related to a particular disease/illness. The video should tell a story and change class perceptions and perspectives regarding healing and illness. It should aim to enlighten and educate your audience through the use of scientific and anthropological language and explanations in lay terms. It should not contribute to stereotyping a particular population or group. All content should be appropriate for a classroom setting and is due on the date of presentation. Creativity is very important. You will be given some class time to work on the project and organize your group. Your grade will be that of the other group members unless determined otherwise. If you or you and your group are having an issue with the group dynamic this must be brought to the instructor's attention immediately. The day you present your video you will give a brief two minute explanation of the content and then show the video to class. In addition your team must turn in a 1 page typed report with the plan of action and tasks completed by each person. You will be allowed to choose your group members in an upcoming class, do not miss class as having a group for this project is required. 18% project & 2% page description=(20%)

<u>Article Search</u>- Provide correct APA format citation and include the following for two scholarly medical anthropology articles with a similar theme: You should identify your theme, include the research problem, research question, research hypothesis, evidence, who was sampled, how variables were measured, conclusions and shortcomings. Each of these sections should be in paragraph form and must be in your own words. Each search should be accompanied by the original article. Plagiarism is not accepted. (10%)

Health Matter Analysis Paper: For this assignment you will analyze an epidemic or global health issue. You will present the history of the epidemic, how human populations and the environment have been impacted and finally you will provide a sustainable solution to eradicate said health issue. You must utilize scientific/scholarly sources. This is a scholarly paper and all references must be cited appropriately (APA format). 4 pages double spaced (18%)

Syllabus Assignment- Students will have to answer a series of questions based off of a thorough reading of the syllabus for this class. The questions will be given to you during

the second week of class on Tuesday and you are expected to turn them in at the start of class on Thursday. (3%)

<u>Pop Quizzes:</u> In addition you will have the opportunity to earn points by correctly answering questions based on the previous lecture, previous days readings or the present days readings. Each quiz will have 4 questions. These will be given at either the start or end of class and I will not be announcing when I will give these quizzes. You will not be allowed to make up these points. Therefore please attend class. (5 quizzes=10%)

<u>Three Exams</u>: Over the course of this class you will have 3 multiple choice exams. The first two exams are 15 % each and the third exam is worth 9% of your final grade. (3 exams = 39% of final grade).

Class Policies

- Extra Credit: There is NO extra credit for this course all points will be earned through assignments, participation, and exams.
- **Syllabus:** The syllabus is subject to change according to the Professor's discretion, in subsequent weeks these changes will be shared during scheduled class time.
- Student Responsibilities: Students are expected to have read the required material, indicated for each day, before entering class. Students are expected to be on time and NOT leave class early, if you do so your grade will be lowered. Students are expected to be attentive and to take notes by notebook. The use of cell phones, i-pods, computers and other electronic devices that could distract the student or others is strongly prohibited and will result in a reduction of your final grade.
- No late assignments will be accepted! No makeup exams allowed! Assignments may be turned in at a later date only for documented medical emergencies, family death or other documented extenuating circumstance. On an exam date or date you must turn in an assignment, you must advise the Professor by e-mail message or in person regarding your emergency. There is a 4 hour grace period for notification. This must be followed up with a written excuse with no exception within 24 hours of the actual exam. The Professor will then provide instructions for submission of the assignment or alternative test date. If you are an athlete and you anticipate an absence on a day that an assignment is due you will be expected to turn the assignment in during the class period before your absence with proper documentation.
- Always hand in assignments directly to the Professor in the class in which they are due, unless otherwise indicated. Any papers, in class questions or exams will be graded

and maintained in your student folder with the professor until the end of the semester. Should there be a discrepancy in the grading please speak to the professor as soon as possible. Once final grades are submitted and after all assignments have been completed and graded it is entirely inappropriate to approach the professor for a grade change (unless there is a documented grading error), extra credit, or special request/exception. You are a student and I, the professor, have the final say and discretion in determining your grade based on your performance, participation and submitted grades.
