Description of Course Content: Project planning, cost controls, and construction related financial documents including: schedule of values, labor and operations cost reports, income statements, balance sheets and construction budgets; emphasis on the development of techniques required to ethically and effectively monitor the financial aspects of a construction project. Prerequisites: Grade of C or better in CM 2331 and Math 1303, and Permission of the CE Chair or Admission to the CM Professional Program.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course, the student will:

- Comprehend the construction process and product delivery methods through the study of project controls, construction documents, construction agreements, schedule of values, construction budgets, business statements, bidding, scheduling and construction administration.
- Analyze the purpose, structure and importance of value engineering in the design, construction and facility
 management processes, and develop critical thinking skills regarding the evaluation of alternative materials,
 equipment and methods involved in construction.
- Develop the ability to analyze and interpret data for analysis from construction business documents and construction scheduling data.
- Advance their ability to design a system, component, or process to meet desired needs within realistic
 constraints such as economic, environmental, social, political, ethical, health and safety, manufacturability, and
 sustainability. In particular, economical analysis, interest calculations, present worth, economic equivalence,
 rate of return and depreciation are covered in the course.
- Grasp the intent and purpose of building codes and green building initiatives.
- Develop insight into the practical applications of engineering principles through presentations by local professionals in the engineering and legal fields.

Specific Course Objectives:

- Application of construction project controls and reporting protocol.
- Scheduling Fundamentals, network construction, activity duration and network calculations.
- Fundamentals of Project Control, cost and schedule performance, Resource Control.
- Present financial aspects of construction projects and the decision making process.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations with due dates: There will be two exams (one close to midterm and one final which will be non-comprehensive), one project, and several homework and lab assignments. See Course Outline for specific dates.

Make-up Exam Policy: All students must take the exams. Only extenuating circumstances will be accepted as excuse for missing the exam. Health related excuses require <u>medical reports</u> and the <u>signature of a physician</u> that provided treatment.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor for this course, I will take attendance for each class. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Drop Policy: Students may drop or swap (adding and dropping a class concurrently) classes through self-service in MyMav from the beginning of the registration period through the late registration period. After the late registration period, students must see their academic advisor to drop a class or withdraw. Undeclared students must see an advisor in the University Advising Center. Drops can continue through a point two-thirds of the way through the term or session. It is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw if they do not plan to attend after registering. **Students will not be automatically dropped for non-attendance**. Repayment of certain types of financial aid administered through the University may be required as the result of dropping classes or withdrawing. Final Review Week: for semester-long courses, a period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.

Laptop use in the classroom: In order to minimize distraction, the use of laptop and/or any other digital device (except standard scientific calculators) in the classroom is NOT allowed.

Emergency Exit Procedures: (Applies to face-to-face courses only.)
