Description of Course Content: Basic musical concepts relating to the jazz idiom such as scales, harmonies, styles, etc. Prerequisite: MUS 1325 or faculty approval

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Write/spell chords from a given jazz chord symbol
- Write/spell scales and modes discussed in this course
- Associate scales and modes with their respective chord symbols
- Discuss and analyze standard jazz forms and chord progressions
- Play basic 4 note jazz piano voicings, as discussed in class

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations: Homework will be given frequently. Unless otherwise noted, it will be due the following class period. Keyboard Proficiency Tests will be given during class when time allows, and outside class per individual appointment throughout the semester. Sign up sheets will be posted when necessary.

Attendance: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required. Expectations for Out-of-Class Study: A general rule of thumb is this: for every credit hour earned, a student should spend 3 hours per week working outside of class. Hence, a 3-credit course might have a minimum expectation of 9 hours of reading, study, etc. Beyond the time required to attend each class meeting, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at sufficient additional hours per week of their own time in practice and preparation for lesson assignments.

Final Review Week: A period of five class days prior to the first day of final examinations in the long sessions shall be designated as Final Review Week. The purpose of this week is to allow students sufficient time to prepare for final examinations. During this week, there shall be no scheduled activities such as required field trips or performances; and no instructor shall assign any themes, research problems or exercises of similar scope that have a completion date during or following this week *unless specified in the class syllabus*. During Final Review Week, an instructor shall not give any examinations constituting 10% or more of the final grade, except makeup tests and laboratory examinations. In addition, no instructor shall give any portion of the final examination during Final Review Week. During this week, classes are held as scheduled. In addition, instructors are not required to limit content to topics that have been previously covered; they may introduce new concepts as appropriate.
