Time and Place of Class Meetings: Mandatory **on-campus** simulation lab experience April 23, 2019 at the Smart Hospital. Class will meet weekly online in Blackboard. While most class participation is asynchronous, some synchronous online activities may be required.

Description of Course Content:

Clinical management of the high-risk neonate with a focus on the perinatal and transition periods as well as stabilization of the ill newborn at birth. Includes fluid and electrolyte management, nutrition, and identification of the indications and complications associated with invasive skills and procedures relevant to the high-risk neonate.

Attendance Policy: At The University of Texas at Arlington, taking attendance is not required but attendance is a critical indicator in student success. Each faculty member is free to develop his or her own methods of evaluating students' academic performance, which includes establishing course-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I monitor the participation of all students. However, while UT Arlington does not require instructors to take attendance in their courses, the U.S. Department of Education requires that the University have a mechanism in place to mark when Federal Student Aid recipients "begin attendance in a course." UT Arlington instructors will report when students begin attendance in a course as part of the final grading process. Specifically, when assigning a student a grade of F, faculty report the last date a student attended their class based on evidence such as a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or an engagement online via Blackboard. This date is reported to the Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Other Requirements: Mandatory on-campus simulation lab experience April 23, 2019 at the Smart Hospital. Students are required to submit papers as documents in an MS-word compatible format. Testing is done using Respondus Monitor and Browser which requires a computer and web cam (tablets may not be used). Safeassign software in Blackboard is used to screen assignments for plagiarism. Synchronous online meetings are held in Collaborate within the course in Blackboard (dates/times to be announced in the course).

Clinical Hours: This class does not require clinical hours, only lab hours.

Grading Policy: Students are expected to keep track of their performance throughout the semester and seek guidance from available sources (including the instructor) if their performance drops below satisfactory levels.

- Work may not be re-submitted for re-grading
- Grades of incomplete are NOT automatically given when there are missing assignments at the end of the course. A student must discuss, with the faculty of record for the course, the reasons that an incomplete grade is being requested. This discussion must occur as soon as the student recognizes that a problem exists. Faculty members are not obligated to grant an incomplete grade. With no prior discussion of the need for an incomplete, students not completing the required activities will receive the grade for the course based on the percentage of the required material submitted.

In this course, you will submit papers as Microsoft Word-compatible documents to a **drop box** in Blackboard. SafeAssign software will be used to screen submissions for plagiarism. **The document**

that you upload to the assignment drop box is the one that will be graded, so be certain it is the correct paper.

Late Assignments Acceptance of late assignments is at the discretion of the instructor and may result in a grade of 0 on the assignment. Tests must be started, completed, and submitted prior to the submission due date and time. No late test submissions will be accepted.

Expectations of Out-of-Class Study: Beyond the time required to participate in class each week, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional 6-9 hours per week on their own time in course-related activities, including reading required materials, completing assignments, preparing for exams, etc.

Consistent with APA format, if five or more words in sequence are taken from a source, those words must be placed in quotes and the source referenced with author's name, date of publication, and page number of publication. If the author's ideas are rephrased, by transposing words or expressing the same idea using different words, the idea must be attributed to the author by proper referencing giving the author's name and date of publication. If a single author's ideas are discussed in more than one paragraph, the author must be referenced, according to APA format. Authors whose words or ideas have been used in the preparation of a paper must be listed in the references cited at the end of the paper.
